- When the camera is used over an extended period, it may become warm. This does not indicate damage.

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



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

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Before Use

Safety Precautions

- Before using the product, ensure that you read the safety precautions. described below. Always ensure that the product is used correctly.
- The safety precautions noted here are intended to prevent you and other persons from being injured or incurring property damage.
- Be sure to also check the guides included with any separately sold. accessories you use.

Warning Denotes the possibility of serious injury or death.

Do not trigger the flash in close proximity to people's eyes.

Exposure to the intense light produced by the flash could damage evesight. In particular, remain at least 1 meter (3.3 feet) away from infants when using the flash.

 Store this equipment out of the reach of children and infants. A strap wound around a child's neck may result in asphyxiation. If your product uses a power cord, mistakenly winding the cord around a child's neck may result in asphyxiation.

- Use only recommended power sources.
- Do not disassemble, alter, or apply heat to the product,
- Avoid dropping or subjecting the product to severe impacts.
- Do not touch the interior of the product if it is broken, such as when dropped.
- Stop using the product immediately if it emits smoke or a strange smell, or otherwise behaves abnormally.
- Do not use organic solvents such as alcohol, benzine, or thinner to clean the product.
- Avoid contact with liquid, and do not allow liquid or foreign objects inside.

This could result in electrical shock or fire.

If the product gets wet, or if liquid or foreign objects get inside, remove the battery pack/batteries or unplug immediately.

 Do not look through the viewfinder (if your model has one) at intense light sources, such as the sun on a clear day or an intense artificial light source.

This could damage your evesight.

- Do not touch the product during thunderstorms if it is plugged in. This could result in electrical shock or fire. Immediately stop using the product and distance yourself from it.
- Use only the recommended battery pack/batteries.
- Do not place the battery pack/batteries near or in direct flame. This may cause the battery pack/batteries to explode or leak, resulting in electrical shock, fire, or injuries. If leaking battery electrolyte comes into contact with eves, mouth, skin, or clothing, immediately flush with water,
- If the product uses a battery charger, note the following precautions.
- Remove the plug periodically and, using a dry cloth, wipe away any dust and dirt that has collected on the plug, the exterior of the power outlet, and the surrounding area.
- Do not insert or remove the plug with wet hands.
- Do not use the equipment in a manner that exceeds the rated capacity of the electrical outlet or wiring accessories. Do not use if the plug is damaged or not fully inserted in the outlet.
- Do not allow dust or metal objects (such as pins or keys) to contact the terminals or plug.
- Do not cut, damage, alter, or place heavy items on the power cord. if your product uses one.

Turn the camera off in places where camera use is prohibited.

The electromagnetic waves emitted by the camera may interfere with the operation of electronic instruments and other devices. Exercise adequate caution when using the product in places where use of electronic devices is restricted, such as inside airplanes and medical facilities.

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 Do not allow the camera to maintain contact with skin for extended periods.

Even if the camera does not feel hot, this may cause low-temperature burns, manifested in redness of the skin or blistering. Use a tripod in hot places, or if you have poor circulation or insensitive skin.

- When carrying the product by the strap, be careful not to bang it. subject it to strong impacts or shocks, or let it get caught on other objects.
- Be careful not to bump or push strongly on the lens.

This could lead to injury or damage the camera.

 Be careful not to subject the screen to strong impacts. If the screen cracks, injury may result from the broken fragments,

 When using the flash, be careful not to cover it with your fingers or clothing.

This could result in burns or damage to the flash.

- Avoid using, placing, or storing the product in the following places:
- Places subject to direct sunlight
- Places subject to temperatures above 40 °C (104 °F)
- Humid or dusty places

These could cause leakage, overheating, or an explosion of the battery pack/batteries, resulting in electrical shock, fire, burns, or other injuries. Overheating and damage may result in electrical shock, fire, burns, or other iniuries.

- The slideshow transition effects may cause discomfort when viewed for prolonged periods.
- · When using optional lenses, lens filters, or filter adapters (if applicable), be sure to attach these accessories firmly.

If the lens accessory becomes loose and falls off, it may crack, and the shards of glass may lead to cuts.

 On products that raise and lower the flash automatically, make sure to avoid pinching your fingers with the lowering flash. This could result in injury.

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

Initial Preparations

Prepare for shooting as follows.

Attaching the Strap



 Thread the end of the strap through the strap hole (①), and then pull the other end of the strap through the loop on the threaded end (②).

Holding the Camera



- Place the strap around your wrist.
- When shooting, keep your arms close to your body and hold the camera securely to prevent it from moving. If you have raised the flash, do not rest your fingers on it.







Charging the Battery Pack

Before use, charge the battery pack with the included charger. Be sure to charge the battery pack initially, because the camera is not sold with the battery pack charged.



Insert the battery pack.

 After aligning the ▲ marks on the battery pack and charger, insert the battery pack by pushing it in (①) and down (②).

Charge the battery pack.

- **CB-2LY**: Flip out the plug (①) and plug the charger into a power outlet (②).
- CB-2LYE: Plug the power cord into the charger, then plug the other end into a power outlet.
- The charging lamp turns orange, and charging begins.
- When charging is finished, the lamp turns green.

3 Remove the battery pack.

 After unplugging the battery charger, remove the battery pack by pushing it in (①) and up (②).

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- Insert the battery pack.
- While pressing the battery lock in the direction of the arrow, insert the battery pack as shown and push it in until it clicks into the locked position.
- If you insert the battery pack facing the wrong way, it cannot be locked into the correct position. Always confirm that the battery pack is facing the right way and locks when inserted

Check the card's write-protect tab and insert the memory card.

- Recording is not possible on memory cards with a write-protect tab when the tab is in the locked position. Slide the tab to the unlocked position.
- Insert the memory card facing as shown until it clicks into the locked position.
- Make sure the memory card is facing the right way when you insert it. Inserting memory cards facing the wrong way may damage the camera.

Close the cover.

Lower the cover (1) and hold it down as vou slide it. until it clicks into the closed position (2).

For guidelines on how many shots or hours of recording can be saved on one memory card, see "Number of 4:3 Shots per Memory Card" (1155).





 To protect the battery pack and keep it in optimal condition, do not charge it continuously for more than 24 hours.

- For battery chargers that use a power cord, do not attach the charger or cord to other objects. Doing so could result in malfunction or damage to the product.
- For details on charging time and the number of shots and recording time possible with a fully charged battery pack, see "Number of Shots/Recording Time, Playback Time" (1155).
- Charged battery packs gradually lose their charge, even when they are not used. Charge the battery pack on (or immediately before) the day of use.
- The charger can be used in areas with 100 240 V AC power (50/60 Hz). For power outlets in a different format, use a commercially available adapter for the plug. Never use an electrical transformer designed for traveling, which may damage the battery pack.

Inserting the Battery Pack and Memory Card

Insert the included battery pack and a memory card (sold separately). Note that before using a new memory card (or a memory card formatted in another device), you should format the memory card with this camera ([[] 117).





Setting the Date and Time

Set the current date and time correctly as follows if the [Date/Time] screen is displayed when you turn the camera on. Information you specify this way is recorded in image properties when you shoot, and it is used when you manage images by shooting date or print images showing the date. You can also add a date stamp to shots, if you wish ([]32).



Access the camera menu. Press the <MENUS button

- Choose [Date/Time]. Move the zoom lever to choose the [ft] tab
- Press the $< A > < \forall >$ buttons to choose [Date/Time], and then press the <())> button.

Change the date and time.

- Follow step 2 in "Setting the Date and Time" (12) to adjust the settings.
- Press the <MENU> button to close the menu.
- Date/time settings can be retained for about 3 weeks by the camera's built-in date/time battery (backup battery) after the battery pack is removed.
 - The date/time battery will be charged in about 4 hours once you insert a charged battery pack or connect the camera to an AC adapter kit (sold separately, 122), even if the camera is left off.
 - · Once the date/time battery is depleted, the [Date/Time] screen will be displayed when you turn the camera on. Set the correct date and time as described in "Setting the Date and Time" (112).

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

Trving the Camera Out

Follow these instructions to turn the camera on, shoot still images or movies, and then view them.

Shooting (Smart Auto)

For fully automatic selection of the optimal settings for specific scenes. simply let the camera determine the subject and shooting conditions.



Turn the camera on

- Press the power button.
- The startup screen is displayed.




Enter [AUTO] mode.

- Set the mode switch to [6].
- Press the <()> button, press the < >< >< >< >< >> buttons to choose [AIITO], and then press the <(S) button again.
- Press the <A><T> buttons to choose [AUTO], and then press the $\langle \mathbb{S}^{(M)} \rangle$ button.



- Aim the camera at the subject. The camera will make a slight clicking noise as it determines the scene
- Icons representing the scene and image stabilization mode are displayed in the upper right of the screen.
- Frames displayed around any detected subjects indicate that they are in focus.









If [Raise the flash] appears on the screen. finger, into the camera.

Compose the shot.

To zoom in and enlarge the subject, move the zoom lever toward $\langle [] \rangle$ (telephoto), and to zoom away from the subject, move it toward <100 (wide angle).



Press the shutter button lightly, halfway down. The camera beeps twice after focusing, and AF frames are displayed to indicate image areas in focus.

- As the camera shoots, a shutter sound is played, and in low-light conditions when you have raised the flash it fires. automatically.
- Keep the camera still until the shutter sound ends
- After displaying your shot, the camera will revert to the shooting screen.

Shooting Movies 1)Start shooting.

- Press the movie button The camera beeps once as recording begins, and
 - [Rec] is displayed with the elapsed time.
- Black bars are displayed on the top and bottom edges of the screen, and the subject is slightly enlarged. The black bars indicate image areas not recorded.
- Frames displayed around any detected faces indicate that they are in focus.
- Once recording begins, take your finger off the movie button

⁽²⁾Finish shooting.

Press the movie button again to stop shooting. The camera beeps twice as recording stops.

Viewing

After shooting images or movies, you can view them on the screen as follows









- Enter Plavback mode.
- Press the < >> button.
- Your last shot is displayed.

Browse through your images.

To view the previous image, press the <<>> button. To view the next image. press the <>> button.

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- To access Scroll Display mode, press and hold the < >< > buttons for at least one second. In this mode, press the < 4 > >buttons to browse through images.
- To return to single-image display, press the < (button.



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Choose an image to erase.

- Press the <()> button, press the <▲><▼> buttons to choose [m]. and then press the $\langle \widehat{\mathbb{W}} \rangle$ button again.
- After [Erase?] is displayed, press the <<>>> buttons to choose [Erase], and then press the <(SE) button.
- The current image is now erased.
- To cancel erasure, press the <**4**><**>**> buttons to choose [Cancel], and then press the <(SE) button.

You can also erase all images at once (176).

Erasing Images

You can choose and erase unneeded images one by one. Be careful when erasing images, because they cannot be recovered.















Play movies.

Press the <()> button, press the < >< >< >< >< >> buttons to choose [>], and then press the $<(\mathbb{R})>$ button again.

Movies are identified by a [SET] icon. To

play movies, go to step 3.

- Playback now begins, and after the movie is finished, [SET] is displayed.
- To adjust the volume, press the $< A > < \nabla >$ buttons.
- To switch to Shooting mode from Playback mode, press the shutter button halfway.

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Shooting Mode

- Press the power button to turn the camera on and prepare for shooting.
- To turn the camera off, press the power button again.

Playback Mode

- Press the <>> button to turn the camera on and view your shots.
- To turn the camera off, press the <>> button again.
- To switch to Playback mode from Shooting mode, press the <>> button.
- To switch to Shooting mode from Playback mode, press the shutter button halfway (<u>119</u>).
- The lens will be retracted after about one minute once the camera is in Playback mode. You can turn the camera off when the lens is retracted by pressing the <>>> button.

As a way to conserve battery power, the camera automatically deactivates the screen (Display Off) and then turns itself off after a specific period of inactivity.

Power Saving in Shooting Mode

The screen is automatically deactivated after about one minute of inactivity. In about two more minutes, the lens is retracted and the camera turns itself off. To activate the screen and prepare for shooting when the screen is off but the lens is still out, press the shutter button halfway ([] 19).

Power Saving in Playback Mode

The camera turns itself off automatically after about five minutes of inactivity.

- You can deactivate Auto Power Down and adjust the timing of Display Off, if you prefer (116).
 - Power saving is not active while the camera is connected to other devices via Wi-Fi (285), or when connected to a computer (2128).

Shutter Button

To ensure your shots are in focus, always begin by holding the shutter button halfway down, and once the subject is in focus, press the button all the way down to shoot.

In this manual, shutter button operations are described as pressing the button halfway or all the way down.



Press halfway. (Press lightly to focus.)

- Press the shutter button halfway. The camera beeps twice, and AF frames are displayed around image areas in focus.
- Press all the way down. (From the halfway position, press fully to shoot.)
 - The camera shoots, as a shutter sound is plaved.
 - Keep the camera still until the shutter sound ends.
- Images may be out of focus if you shoot without initially pressing the shutter button halfway.
 - Length of shutter sound playback varies depending on the time required for the shot. It may take longer in some shooting scenes, and images will be blurry if you move the camera (or the subject moves) before the shutter sound ends.

Shooting Display Options

Press the $< \mathbf{\nabla} >$ button to view other information on the screen, or to hide the information. For details on the information displayed, see "On-Screen Information" ($\square 144$).





Information is displayed

No information is displayed

- Screen brightness is automatically increased by the night view function when you are shooting under low light, making it easier to check how shots. are composed. However, on-screen image brightness may not match the brightness of your shots. Note that any on-screen image distortion or jerky subject motion will not affect recorded images.
- For playback display options, see "Switching Display Modes" (267).

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


Using the FUNC. Menu

Configure commonly used functions through the FUNC. menu as follows. Note that menu items and options vary depending on the shooting mode ($\square 147 - 148$) or playback mode ($\square 153$).

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

 - Sounds and vibrations from operating the camera will be recorded in digest movies.
- Digest movie quality is [EHD] and cannot be changed.
- Sounds are not played when you press the shutter button halfway or trigger the self-timer ([114).
- Digest movies are saved as separate movie files in the following cases even if they were recorded on the same day in [20] mode.
- The digest movie file size reaches approximately 4 GB, or the total recording time reaches approximately 29 minutes and 59 seconds.
- The digest movie is protected (273).
- Daylight saving time (12) or time zone (115) settings are changed.
 A new folder is created (118).
- · Recorded shutter sounds cannot be modified or erased.
- If you prefer to record digest movies without still images, adjust the setting in advance. Choose MENU (□21)
 Imit to Cligest Type]
 Ino Stills].
- Individual chapters can be edited (¹⁸⁴).

 - The subject may be too close if the camera only beeps once when you press the shutter button halfway. For details on the focusing range (shooting range), see "Shooting Range" (1156).
 - To reduce red-eye and to assist in focusing, the lamp may be activated when shooting in low-light conditions.
 - A blinking [\$] icon displayed when you attempt to shoot indicates that shooting is not possible until the flash has finished recharging. Shooting can resume as soon as the flash is ready, so either press the shutter button all the way down and wait, or release it and press it again.
 - Although you can shoot again before the shooting screen is displayed, your previous shot may determine the focus, brightness, and colors used.

You can change how long images are displayed after shots (<u>138</u>).

• The camera may become warm when shooting movies repeatedly over an extended period. This does not indicate damage.



 Before shooting a movie, lower the flash with your finger. Be careful not to touch the microphone when shooting a movie. Leaving the flash raised, or blocking the microphone may prevent audio from being recorded or may cause the recording to sound muffled.

- Avoid touching camera controls other than the movie button when shooting movies, because sounds made by the camera will be recorded.
- Once movie recording begins, the image display area changes and subjects are enlarged to allow for correction of significant camera shake. To shoot subjects at the same size shown before shooting, adjust the image stabilization setting (¹⁶⁴).

• Audio recording is monaural.

On-Screen Frames

In [AUTO] mode, a variety of frames are displayed once the camera detects subjects you are aiming the camera at.

• A white frame is displayed around the subject (or person's face) determined by the camera to be the main subject, and gray frames are displayed around other detected faces. Frames follow moving subjects within a certain range to keep them in focus.

However, if the camera detects subject movement, only the white frame will remain on the screen.

- When you are pressing the shutter button halfway and the camera detects subject movement, a blue frame is displayed, and the focus and image brightness are constantly adjusted (Servo AF).
 - Try shooting in [P] mode (
 —51) if no frames are displayed, if frames are not displayed around desired subjects, or if frames are displayed on the background or similar areas.

Zooming In Closer on Subjects (Digital Zoom)

When distant subjects are too far away to enlarge using the optical zoom, use digital zoom for up to about 72x enlargement.





Move the zoom lever toward <[].

The camera can add the shooting date to images, in the lower-right corner. However, note that date stamps cannot be edited or removed, so confirm beforehand that the date and time are correct ($\square 12$).





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

The camera determines the subject and shooting conditions, automatically applying special effects and recomposing the shot to emphasize the subject. Six still images are recorded for each shot. You can capture multiple still images with effects using camera-determined settings.





Enter [Oy] mode.

Shoot.

- Press the shutter button all the way down. As you shoot, the shutter sound is played three times.
- After the six images are displayed in succession, they are displayed simultaneously for about two seconds.

- To return to the original display, press the <MENU> button.

 Shooting will take some time when the flash fires, but hold the camera steady until the shutter sound is played three times. The six images from each shot are managed together as a group, and only the first image in the series is displayed during playback. To indicate that the image is part of a group, [SII] is displayed in the upper left of the screen.

Image Display during Playback

- If you erase a grouped image (¹⁷⁶), all images in the group are also erased. Be careful when erasing images.
- Grouped images can be played back individually (¹⁰70) and ungrouped (¹⁰70).
 - Protecting (273) a grouped image will protect all images in the group.
 - Grouped images can be viewed individually when played back using Image Search (<u>69</u>) or Smart Shuffle (<u>72</u>). In this case, images are temporarily ungrouped.
 - The following actions are not available for grouped images: magnifying (\$\overline\$71), rotating (\$\overline\$78), tagging as favorites (\$\overline\$79), editing (\$\overline\$80
 - 83), printing (2129), adding to the print list (2133), or adding to a photobook (2135). To do these things, either view grouped images individually (270) or cancel grouping (270) first.
 - Simultaneous display as shown in step 2 is only available immediately after you shoot.

- To change privacy settings for smartphones added to the list, choose the smartphone whose settings you want to change from [Edit a Device] in step 3, and then choose [View Settings].

Previous Access Points

You can reconnect to any previous access points automatically by following step 3 in "Connecting without an Access Point" (2100).

- To use the camera as an access point, choose [Switch Network] on the screen displayed when you establish a connection, and then choose [Camera Access Point Mode].
- When reconnecting via a previous access point, connect the target device to the access point in step 4.
- To switch access points, choose [Switch Network] on the screen displayed when you establish a connection, and then follow the procedure in "Connecting to WPS-Compatible Access Points" from step 5 (<u>97</u>).

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Connecting to Another Camera

Connect two cameras via Wi-Fi and send images between them as follows.

 Only Canon-brand cameras equipped with a Wi-Fi function can be connected to wirelessly. Even Canon-brand cameras that support Eye-Fi cards cannot be connected to if they do not have a Wi-Fi function. You cannot connect to PowerShot SD430 DIGITAL ELPH WIRELESS/DIGITAL IXUS WIRELESS cameras with this camera.

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Sending Images

Send images wirelessly to destinations registered on the camera as follows. Note that when images are sent to a computer, the computer is used instead of the camera (1105).

- Depending on the condition of the network you are using, it may take a long time to send movies. Be sure to keep an eve on the camera battery level
- When sending movies to smartphones note that the supported image quality varies depending on the smartphone. For details, refer to the smartphone user manual
- To disconnect from the camera, press the $\langle MENU \rangle$ button, press the $\langle 4 \rangle \langle b \rangle$ buttons to choose IOK1 on the confirmation screen, and then press the $\langle \widehat{W} \rangle >$ button. You can also use the smartphone to end the connection
- Up to 50 images can be sent together at once. You can send movies together as long as the total playback time is within two minutes. However, Web services may limit the number of images or length of movies you can send. For details, refer to the Web service you are using.
- On the screen, wireless signal strength is indicated by the following icons. [Y.I] high, [Y.] medium, [Y] low, [Y] weak
- Only images larger than the resolution you selected in step 3 will be resized.
- Movies cannot be resized.
- To send only one of the displayed images, choose [Resize] on the screen in step 1, change the size, and choose [Send this image].
- Sending images to Web services will take less time when resending images. vou have already sent that are still on the CANON iMAGE GATEWAY server.

Adding Comments

Using the camera, you can add comments to images that you send to e-mail addresses, social networking services, etc. The number of characters and symbols that can be entered may differ depending on the Web service.



- 1 Access the screen for adding comments.

- 2 Add a comment (22).
- Send the image.
- Follow the steps in "Sending Images" (103) to send the image.

When a comment is not entered, the comment set in CANON iMAGE GATEWAY is automatically sent.

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Saving Images to a Computer

When sending images to a computer, use the computer instead of the camera.

- Images are now saved to the Pictures folder on the computer, in separate folders named by date.
- Click [OK] in the screen that is displayed after image import is complete. For instructions on viewing images on a computer, refer to "Software Instruction Manual" (2127).

Movies will take longer to import since the file size is larger than still images.

• To disconnect from the camera, turn off the camera.

- You can also specify to save all images or only selected images to the computer, and you can change the destination folder. Refer to "Software Instruction Manual" (<u>1127</u>) for details.
- Windows 7: If the screen in step 2 is not displayed, click the [i] icon in the taskbar.
- Mac OS: If CameraWindow is not displayed, click the [CameraWindow] icon in the Dock.
- Although you can save images to a computer simply by connecting your camera to the computer without using the software, the following limitations apply.
- It may take a few minutes after you connect the camera to the computer until camera images are accessible.
- Images shot in vertical orientation may be saved in horizontal orientation.
- Image protection settings may be cleared from images saved to a computer.
- Some problems may occur when saving images or image information, depending on the operating system version, the software in use, or image file sizes.
- Some functions provided by the software may not be available, such as movie editing.

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Using the < > Button

Once you have registered a smartphone or Image Sync (\Box 108) to the < \Box > button, you can connect to the registered destination simply by pressing the < \Box > button.

Registering a Smartphone to the < > Button

Once you have connected to a smartphone initially via Wi-Fi by pressing the $\langle \Box \rangle$ button, you can simply press the $\langle \Box \rangle$ button after that to connect again for viewing and saving camera images on connected devices.

- To choose a Web service as the destination, follow the steps in "Registering Other Web Services" (<u>191</u>) to update the camera settings.

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Sending Images

Images sent from the camera are automatically saved to the computer. If the computer that you intend to send images to is turned off, the images will be stored temporarily on the CANON iMAGE GATEWAY server. Stored images are regularly erased, so make sure to turn on the computer and save the images.

- Follow the steps in "Connecting to WPS-Compatible Access Points" (<u>96</u>) to choose [<u>1</u>].
- Once the connection is established, the images are sent.
- When the images have been sent successfully to the CANON iMAGE GATEWAY server, [[1]] is displayed on the screen.
- Images are automatically saved to the computer when you turn it on.
- Images are automatically sent to Web services from the CANON iMAGE GATEWAY server, even if the computer is off.
- When sending images, you should use a fully charged battery pack or an AC adapter kit (sold separately, ¹²²).
- Even if images were imported to the computer through a different method, any images not sent to the computer via CANON iMAGE GATEWAY will be sent to the computer.
- Sending is faster when the destination is a computer on the same network as the camera, because images are sent via the access point instead of CANON iMAGE GATEWAY. Note that images stored on the computer are sent to CANON iMAGE GATEWAY, so the computer must be connected to the Internet.

Geotagging Images on the Camera

GPS data recorded on a smartphone using the dedicated CameraWindow application (191) can be added to images on the camera. Images are tagged with information including the latitude, longitude, and elevation.

- Before shooting, make sure the date and time and your home time zone are set correctly. (See "Setting the Date and Time" (212).)
 Additionally, in [Time Zone] (2115), specify any shooting destinations that are in other time zones.
 - The smartphone you will use for geotagging must be authorized to view the images on the camera (198, 101).
 - Others may be able to locate or identify you by using location data in your geotagged still images or movies. Be careful when sharing these images with others, as when posting images online where many others can view them.

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Shooting Remotely

As you check a shooting screen on your smartphone, you can use it to shoot remotely.

Secure the camera.

- Once remote shooting begins, the camera lens will come out. Lens motion from zooming may also move the camera out of position. Keep the camera still by mounting it on a tripod or taking other measures.
- **2** Connect the camera and smartphone (
- In the privacy settings (<u>98, 101</u>), choose [Yes].

3 Choose remote shooting.

- In CameraWindow (¹⁹¹) on the smartphone, choose remote shooting.
- The camera lens will come out. Do not press near the lens, and make sure no objects will obstruct it.
- Once the camera is ready for remote shooting, a live image from the camera will be displayed on the smartphone.
- At this time, a message is displayed on the camera, and all operations except pressing the power button are disabled.

4 Shoot.

Use the smartphone to shoot.

- The camera works in [P] mode during remote shooting. However, some FUNC. and MENU settings you have configured in advance may be changed automatically.
 - · Movie shooting is not available.
 - In camera settings, the smartphone must be allowed to view camera images (<u>98, 101</u>).
- Any jerky subject motion shown on the smartphone due to the connection environment will not affect recorded images.
- · No AF frames are displayed. Capture a test image to check the focus.
- Captured images are not transferred to the smartphone. Use the smartphone to browse and import images from the camera.
- Remote control is also possible from the smartphone assigned to the <_> button (__106).

Troubleshooting

If you think there is a problem with the camera, first check the following. If the items below do not solve your problem, contact a Canon Customer Support Help Desk.

Power

Nothing happens when the power button is pressed.

- Confirm that the battery pack is charged (110).
- Confirm that the battery pack is inserted facing the correct way (111).
- Confirm that the memory card/battery cover is fully closed ([11]).
- Dirty battery terminals reduce battery performance. Try cleaning the terminals with a cotton swab and reinserting the battery pack a few times.

The battery pack runs out of power quickly.

- Battery performance decreases at low temperatures. Try warming the battery pack a little by putting it in your pocket, for example, ensuring that the terminals do not touch any metal objects.
- If these measures do not help and the battery pack still runs out of power soon after charging, it has reached the end of its life. Purchase a new battery pack.
- Dirty battery terminals reduce battery performance. Try cleaning the terminals with a cotton swab and reinserting the battery pack a few times.

The lens is not retracted.

 Do not open the memory card/battery cover while the camera is on. Close the cover, turn the camera on, and then turn it off again (
11).

The battery pack is swollen.

 Battery swelling is normal and does not pose any safety concerns. However, if battery swelling prevents the battery pack from fitting in the camera, contact a Canon Customer Support Help Desk.

Display on a TV

Camera images look distorted or not displayed on a TV (1126).

Shooting

• In Playback mode (265), press the shutter button halfway (219).

Strange display on the screen under low light ($\square 19$).

Note that the following display problems are not recorded in still images but are recorded in movies.

 The screen may flicker and horizontal banding may appear under fluorescent or LED lighting.

No date stamp is added to images.

- Configure the [Date Stamp 7] setting (132). Note that date stamps are not added to images automatically, merely because you have configured the [Date/Time] (12) setting.
- Date stamps are not added in shooting modes (<u>151</u>) in which this setting cannot be configured (<u>132</u>).

[**\$**] flashes on the screen when the shutter button is pressed, and shooting is not possible (28).

$[\Omega]$ is displayed when the shutter button is pressed halfway (Ω 28).

- Set [IS Mode] to [Continuous] (163).
- Raise the flash and set the flash mode to [\$] ([161).
- Increase the ISO speed (<u>154</u>).
- Mount the camera on a tripod or take other measures to keep it still. In this case, you should set [IS Mode] to [Off] ([]63).

Shots are out of focus.

- Press the shutter button halfway to focus on subjects before pressing it all the way down to shoot (119).
- Make sure subjects are within focusing range (<u>156</u>).
- Set [AF-assist Beam] to [On] (137).
- · Confirm that unneeded functions such as macro are deactivated.
- Try shooting with focus lock or AF lock (259, 61).

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No AF frames are displayed and the camera does not focus when the shutter button is pressed halfway.

 To have AF frames displayed and the camera focus correctly, try composing the shot with higher-contrast subject areas centered before you press the shutter button halfway. Otherwise, try pressing the shutter button halfway repeatedly.

Subjects in shots look too dark.

- Raise the flash and set the flash mode to [4] ([161).
- Adjust brightness by using exposure compensation (<u>152</u>).
- Adjust contrast by using i-Contrast (254, 82).
- Use AE lock or spot metering (153).

Subjects look too bright, highlights are washed-out.

- Lower the flash and set the flash mode to [(\$)] ([]26).
- Adjust brightness by using exposure compensation (252).
- Use AE lock or spot metering (153).
- · Reduce the lighting on subjects.

Shots look too dark despite the flash firing (28).

- Shoot within flash range (1156).
- Increase the ISO speed (<u>154</u>).

Subjects in flash shots look too bright, highlights are washed-out.

- Shoot within flash range (1156).
- Lower the flash and set the flash mode to [3] (226).

White dots or similar image artifacts appear in flash shots.

• This is caused by light from the flash reflecting off dust or airborne particles.

Shots look grainy.

- Lower the ISO speed (¹⁵⁴).
- High ISO speeds in some shooting modes may cause grainy images (¹⁴²).

Subjects are affected by red-eye (235).

- Set [Red-Eye Lamp] to [On] (¹)38) to activate the red-eye reduction lamp (¹)3) in flash shots. Note that while the red-eye reduction lamp is on (for about one second), it is not possible to shoot, because the lamp is counteracting red-eye. For best results, have subjects look at the red-eye reduction lamp. Also try increasing the lighting in indoor scenes and shooting at closer range.
- Edit images using red-eye correction (282).

Recording to the memory card takes too long, or continuous shooting is slower.

• Use the camera to perform low-level formatting of the memory card (117).

Shooting settings or FUNC. menu settings are not available.

 Available setting items vary by shooting mode. Refer to "Functions Available in Each Shooting Mode", "FUNC. Menu", and "Shooting Tab Menu" (<u>1146 – 151</u>).

Shooting Movies

The elapsed time shown is incorrect, or recording is interrupted.

Use the camera to format the memory card, or switch to a card that supports high-speed recording. Note that even if the elapsed time display is incorrect, the length of movies on the memory card corresponds to the actual recording time (
117, 156).

[1] is displayed and shooting stops automatically.

The camera's internal memory buffer filled up as the camera could not record to the memory card quickly enough. Try one of the following measures.

- Use the camera to perform low-level formatting of the memory card ([117).
- Lower the image quality (¹³⁵).

Zooming is not possible.

Zooming is not possible when shooting movies in [4] mode (45).

Subjects look distorted.

 Subjects that pass in front of the camera quickly may look distorted. This is not a malfunction.

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Playback

Playback is not possible.

 Image or movie playback may not be possible if a computer is used to rename files or alter the folder structure. Refer to "Software Instruction Manual" (2127) for details on folder structure and file names.

Playback stops, or audio skips.

- Switch to a memory card that you have performed low-level formatting on with the camera (<u>117</u>).
- There may be brief interruptions when playing movies copied to memory cards that have slow read speeds.
- When movies are played on a computer, frames may be dropped and audio may skip if computer performance is inadequate.

Sound is not played during movies.

- Adjust the volume (166) if you have activated [Mute] (114) or the sound in the movie is faint.
- No sound is played for movies shot in [2] mode (245) because audio is not recorded in this mode.

Memory Card

The memory card is not recognized.

• Restart the camera, with the memory card in it (118).

Computer

Cannot transfer images to a computer.

When attempting to transfer images to the computer via a cable, try reducing the transfer speed as follows.

Press the < >> button to enter Playback mode. Hold the < MENU> button down as you press the < A> and < ()> buttons at the same time. On the next screen, press the < <>> buttons to choose [B], and then press the <)> button.

Wi-Fi

Cannot access the Wi-Fi menu by pressing the <▲> button.

- The Wi-Fi menu is not available in Shooting mode. Switch to Playback mode and try
 again.
- In Playback mode, the Wi-Fi menu cannot be accessed during detailed information display, magnified display, or index display. Switch to single-image display and a viewing mode other than detailed information display. Similarly, the Wi-Fi menu cannot be accessed during group playback or filtered image display according to specified conditions. Cancel group or filtered image playback.
- The Wi-Fi menu cannot be accessed while the camera is connected to a printer, computer, or TV via a cable. Disconnect the cable.

Cannot add a device/destination.

- A total of 20 items of connection information can be added to the camera. Erase unneeded connection information from the camera first, and then add new devices/ destinations (<u>1111</u>).
- Use a computer or smartphone to register Web services (288).
- To add a smartphone, first install the dedicated application CameraWindow on your smartphone (291).
- To add a computer, first install the software CameraWindow on your computer. Also check your computer and Wi-Fi environment and settings (292, 95).
- Do not use the camera near sources of Wi-Fi signal interference, such as microwave ovens, Bluetooth devices, or other equipment operating on the 2.4 GHz band.
- Bring the camera closer to the other device you are trying to connect to (such as the access point), and make sure there are no objects between the devices.

Cannot connect to the access point.

 Confirm that the access point channel is set to a channel supported by the camera (<u>154</u>). Note that instead of auto channel assignment, it is advisable to specify a supported channel manually.

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Cannot send images.

- The destination device has insufficient storage space. Increase the storage space on the destination device and resend the images.
- The write-protect tab of the memory card in the destination camera is set to the locked position. Slide the write-protect tab to the unlocked position.
- Images are not sent to CANON iMAGE GATEWAY or other Web services if you move or rename image files or folders on the computer that received images sent using Image Sync via an access point (1108). Before moving or renaming these image files or folders on the computer, make sure the images have already been sent to CANON iMAGE GATEWAY or other Web services.

Cannot resize images for sending.

- Images cannot be resized to be bigger than the resolution setting of their original size.
- Movies cannot be resized.

Images take a long time to send./The wireless connection is disrupted.

- Multiple images may take a long time to send. Try resizing the image to [M2] or [S] to reduce sending time ([103).
- · Movies may take a long time to send.
- Do not use the camera near sources of Wi-Fi signal interference, such as microwave ovens, Bluetooth devices, or other equipment operating on the 2.4 GHz band. Note that images may take a long time to send even when [Yi] is displayed.
- Bring the camera closer to the other device you are trying to connect to (such as the access point), and make sure there are no objects between the devices.

Want to erase Wi-Fi connection information before disposing of the camera or giving it to someone else.

• Reset the Wi-Fi settings (112).

Grouped images cannot be processed (¹⁴³).

Invalid selection range

 When specifying a range for image selection (<u>174, 77, 134</u>), you attempted to choose an initial image that was after the final image, or vice-versa.

Exceeded selection limit

- More than 998 images were selected for Print List (
 133) or Photobook Set-up
 (
 135). Choose 998 images or less.
- Print List (133) or Photobook Set-up (135) settings could not be saved correctly. Reduce the number of selected images and try again.
- You attempted to choose more than 500 images in Protect (173), Erase (176), Favorites (179), Print List (1133), or Photobook Set-up (1135).

Naming error!

 The folder could not be created or images could not be recorded, because the highest supported folder number (999) for storing images on the card has been reached and the highest supported image number (9999) for images in folders has been reached. On the [11] tab, change [File Numbering] to [Auto Reset] ([118]), or format the memory card ([117]).

Lens Error

- This error may occur if the lens is held while it is moving, or when the camera is used in dusty or sandy locations.
- Frequent display of this error message may indicate camera damage. In this case, contact a Canon Customer Support Help Desk.

A camera error was detected (error number)

- If this error message is displayed immediately after a shot, the image may not have been saved. Switch to Playback mode to check for the image.
- Frequent display of this error message may indicate camera damage. In this case, write down the error number (*Exx*) and contact a Canon Customer Support Help Desk.

File Error

 Correct printing (22) may not be possible for photos from other cameras or images that have been altered using computer software, even if the camera is connected to the printer.

Print error

 Check the paper size setting (¹¹³¹). If this error message is displayed when the setting is correct, restart the printer and complete the setting on the camera again.

Ink absorber full

 Contact a Canon Customer Support Help Desk to request assistance with ink absorber replacement.

Wi-Fi

Connection failed

- No access points were recognized. Check the access point settings (195).
- A device could not be found. Turn the camera off and on again, and retry the connection.
- Check the device you want to connect to and make sure it is ready for connection.

Cannot determine access point

The WPS buttons on numerous access points were pressed simultaneously. Try reconnecting again.

No access points found

- · Check to make sure that the access point is turned on.
- When connecting to an access point manually, make sure that you entered the correct SSID.

Incorrect password/Incorrect Wi-Fi security settings

Check the access point security settings (195).

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IP address conflict

• Reset the IP address so that it does not conflict with another.

Disconnected/Receiving failed/Sending failed

- · You may be in an environment where Wi-Fi signals are obstructed.
- Avoid using the camera's Wi-Fi function around microwave ovens, Bluetooth devices, and other devices that operate on the 2.4 GHz band.
- Bring the camera closer to the other device you are trying to connect to (such as the
 access point), and make sure there are no objects between the devices.
- · Check the connected device to make sure it is not experiencing errors.

Sending failed Memory card error

 If the same error message is displayed even when you have inserted a formatted memory card facing the correct way, contact a Canon Customer Support Help Desk.

Receiving failed Insufficient space on card

 There is not enough free space on the memory card in the target camera to receive images. Erase images to create space on the memory card, or insert a memory card with sufficient space.

Receiving failed Memory card locked

• The write-protect tab of the memory card in the camera to receive the images is set to the locked position. Slide the write-protect tab to the unlocked position.

Receiving failed Naming error!

• When the highest folder number (999), and the highest image number (9999) have been reached on the receiving camera, images cannot be received.

Insufficient space on server

- Delete unnecessary images uploaded to CANON iMAGE GATEWAY to create space.
- Save the images sent via Image Sync (1108) to your computer.



Handling Precautions

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
