The Ni-MH battery charger is designed for FUJIFILM HR-AA Ni-MH batteries. Using the charger to charge conventional batteries or other types of rechargeable batteries can cause the battery to leak fluid. overheat or burst.





Do not use in the presence of flammable objects, explosive gases, or dust.



When carrying the battery, install it in a digital camera or keep it in the hard case. When storing the battery, keep it in the hard case. When discarding,



Power Supply and Battery

* Confirm your battery type before reading the following descriptions.

The following explains proper use of batteries and how to prolong their life. Incorrect use of batteries can cause shorter battery life, as well as leakage, excessive heat, fire or explosion.

1 Camera uses the Rechargeable Lithium-ion Battery

- * When shipped, the battery is not fully charged. Always charge the battery before using it.
- * When carrying the battery, install it in a digital camera or keep it in the soft case

■ Battery Features

- · The battery gradually loses its charge even when not used. Use a battery that has been charged recently (in the last day or two) to take pictures.
- · To maximize the life of the battery. turn the camera off as quickly as possible when it is not being used.
- · The number of available frames will be lower in cold locations or at low temperatures. Take along a spare fully charged battery. You can also increase the amount of power produced by putting the battery in your pocket or another warm place to heat it and then loading it into the camera just before you take a picture.

If you are using a heating pad, take **Battery Life** care not to place the battery directly against the pad. The camera may not operate if you use a depleted battery in cold conditions.

■ Charging the Battery

- · You can charge the battery using the battery charger (included).
- The battery can be charged tween 0°C and +40°C (+32°F and +104°F). Refer to the Owner's Manual for the time of charging battery.
- You should charge the battery at an ambient temperature be- . If you do not intend to use the tween +10°C and +35°C (+50°F and +95°F). If you charge the battery at a temperature outside this range, charging takes longer because the performance of the battery is impaired.
- You cannot charge the battery at temperatures of 0°C (+32°F) or below.
- · The Rechargeable Lithium-ion Battery does not need to be fully discharged or exhausted flat before being charged.
- · The battery may feel warm after it has been charged or immediately after being used. This is perfectly normal
- · Do not recharge a fully charged battery.

At normal temperatures, the battery can be used at least 300 times. If the time for which the battery . Do not expose the battery to waprovides power shortens markedly, this indicates that the battery has . Always keep the battery terminals reached the end of its effective life and should be replaced.

■ Notes on storage

- at ambient temperatures be- · If a battery is stored for long periods while charged, the performance of the battery can be impaired. If the battery will not be used for some time, run the battery out before storing it.

- · Do not heat the batteries or throw them into a fire.
- · Do not carry or store batteries with metal objects such as necklaces or hairpins.
- · Do not expose the batteries to water, and keep batteries from getting wet or stored in moist locations.
- · Do not attempt to take apart or change the batteries, including battery casings.
- · Do not subject the batteries to strong impacts.

- · Do not use batteries that are leaking, deformed, discolored.
- · Do not store batteries in warm or humid places.
- · Keep the batteries out of reach of babies and small children.
- · Make sure that the battery polarity (⊕ and ⊖) is correct.
- · Do not use new with used batteries. Do not use charged and discharged batteries together.
- · Do not use different types or brands of batteries at the same time
- · If you do not intend to use the camera for a long period of time, remove the batteries from the camera. Note if the camera is left • Ni-MH batteries left unused in with the batteries removed, the time and date settings are cleared.
- The batteries feel warm right after being used. Before removing the batteries, turn the camera off and wait for the batteries to cool down.
- Since batteries do not work well in cold weather or locations, warm the batteries by placing them inside your garments before use. Batteries do not work well when cold. They will work again when the temperature returns to normal.
- · Soil (such as fingerprints) on the battery terminals makes the batteries charge less reducing the number of images. Carefully wipe the battery terminals with a soft dry cloth before loading.



If any liquid at all leaks from the batteries, wipe the battery compartment thoroughly and then load new batteries.



If any battery fluid comes into contact with your hands or clothing, flush the area thoroughly with water. Note that battery fluid can cause loss of evesight if it gets into your eyes. If this occurs, do not rub your eyes. Flush the fluid out with clean water and contact your physician for treatment.

■ Using the AA-size Ni-MH batteries correctly

storage for long periods can become "deactivated". Also, repeatedly charging Ni-MH batteries that are only partially discharged can cause them to suffer from the "memory effect". Ni-MH batteries that are "deactivated" or affected by "memory" suffer from the problem of only providing power for a short time after being charged. To prevent this problem, discharge and recharge them several times using the camera's "Discharging rechargeable batteries" function. Deactivation and memory are specific to Ni-MH batteries and are not in fact battery faults.

See Owner's Manual for the procedure for "Discharging rechargeable batteries".

(?) CAUTION

Do not use the "Discharging rechargeable batteries" function when alkaline batteries being used.

- · To charge Ni-MH batteries, use the guick battery charger (sold separately). Refer to the instructions supplied with the charger to make sure that the charger is used correctly.
- · Do not use the battery charger to charge other batteries.
- · Note that the batteries feel warm after being charged.
- · Due to the way the camera is constructed, a small amount of current is used even when the camera is turned off. Note in particular that leaving Ni-MH batteries in the camera for a long period will overdischarge the batteries and may render them unusable even after recharging.
- Ni-MH batteries will self-discharge even when not used, and the time for which they can be used may be shortened as a result.
- · Ni-MH batteries will deteriorate rapidly if over-discharged (e.g. by discharging the batteries in a flashlight). Use the "Discharging rechargeable batteries" function provided in the camera to discharge the batteries.

· Ni-MH batteries have a limited service life. If a battery can only be used for a short time even after repeated discharge-charge cycles, it may have reached the end of its service life.

■ Disposing of Batteries

· When disposing of batteries, do so in accordance with your local waste disposal regulations.

■ AC Power Adapter

Always use the AC Power Adapter with the camera. The use of an AC Power adapter other than FUJIFILM AC Power Adapter can be damaged to your digital camera.

- · Plug the connection cord plug securely into the DC input terminal.
- · Turn off the FUJIFILM Digital camera before disconnecting the cord from the DC input terminal. To disconnect, pull out the plug gently. Do not pull on the cord.
- · Do not use the AC power adapter with any device other than your camera.
- · During use, the AC power adapter will become hot to the touch. This is normal.

The Electronic Viewfinder (EVF)

The electronic viewfinder provides the same information as the monitor, and can be used when bright lighting conditions make the display in the monitor difficult to see. Press **EVF/LCD** button to select from the auto switch, monitor, or electric view finder mode. When the auto switch mode is set, the electric view finder turns on automatically when you put your eye to the view finder, and the monitor turns on when you take your eye away (note that the eye sensor may not respond if you are wearing glasses or your head is an angle to the camera).



The camera is equipped with diopter adjustment to accommodate individual differences in vision. Slide the diopter adjustment control up and down until the view-finder display is in sharp focus.


Bright Ambient Lighting

Reflections and glare caused by bright ambient lighting may make it hard to see the display in the monitor, particularly when the camera is used outdoors. This can be addressed by holding the **EVF/LCD** button to trigger outdoor mode. Outdoor mode can also be enabled using the **SCREEN SET-UP** > **MONITOR SUNLIGHT MODE** option in the setup menu (**99**).







- Do not affix stickers or other objects to the battery. Failure to observe this precaution could make it impossible to remove the battery from the camera.
- Do not short the battery terminals. The battery could overheat
- Read the cautions in "Power Supply and Battery" (■ vi).
- Use only battery chargers designated for use with the battery. Failure to observe this precaution could result in product malfunction.





- Format SD/SDHC/SDXC memory cards before first use, and be sure to reformat all memory cards after using them in a computer or other device. For more information on formatting memory cards, see " FORMAT" (102).
- Memory cards are small and can be swallowed; keep out of reach of children. If a child swallows a memory card, seek medical assistance immediately.

Depending on the subject and shooting conditions, the camera may produce distorted results or a panorama. The top and bottom of the area visible in the shooting display are cropped out and white strips may appear at the top and bottom of the display.

For Best Results

For best results, move the camera in a small circle at a steady speed, keeping the camera horizontal and being careful only to pan in the direction shown by the guides. If the desired results are not achieved, try panning at a different speed.

P: PROGRAM AE

In this mode, the camera sets exposure automatically. If desired, you can choose different combinations of shutter speed and aperture that will produce the same exposure (program shift).

If the subject is outside the metering range of the camera, the shutter speed and aperture displays will show "---". Press the shutter button halfway to measure exposure again.

Program Shift

Rotate the command dial to choose the desired combination of shutter speed and aperture. The default values can be restored by raising the flash or turning the camera off. Program shift is only available if the flash is off and an option other than **AUTO** is selected for **MOTO DYNAMIC RANGE** and **MOTO ISO**.





In this mode, you choose both shutter speed and aperture. If desired, exposure can be altered from the value suggested by the camera.

The Exposure Indicator

Autofocus

Although the camera boasts a high-precision autofocus system, it may be unable to focus on the subjects listed below. If the camera is unable to focus using autofocus, use focus lock to focus on another subject at the same distance and then recompose the photograph.

- Very shiny subjects such as mirrors or car bodies.
- Fast-moving subjects.
- Subjects photographed through a window or other reflective object.
- Dark subjects and subjects that absorb rather than reflect light, such as hair or fur.
- Insubstantial subjects, such as smoke or flame.
- Subjects that show little contrast with the background (for example, subjects in clothing that is the same color as the background).
- Subjects positioned in front of or behind a highcontrast object that is also in the focus frame (for example, a subject photographed against a backdrop of highly contrasting elements).


The AE/AF LOCK Button

The **AE/AF LOCK** button can be used to lock exposure or focus.

Locking Exposure

Locking Focus

If AF LOCK ONLY is selected for AE/AF-LOCK BUTTON in the setup menu (1999), pressing the AE/AF LOCK button locks focus. If AE/AF LOCK is selected, both focus and exposure will be locked.



If **AE&AF ON/OFF SWITCH** is selected for **AE/AF-LOCK MODE** in the setup menu (**AE/AF-LOCK** button is pressed and remain locked until the button is pressed again.

Macro and Super Macro Modes (Close-ups)

For close-ups, press the selector left (to choose from the macro options shown below.

When macro mode is in effect, the camera focuses on subjects near the center of the frame. Use the zoom ring to compose pictures. The following restrictions apply in super macro mode: the lens must be zoomed all the way out (at other zoom positions, ♣ is displayed) and the flash can not be used.



- Use of a tripod is recommended to prevent blur caused by camera shake.
- Flash compensation may be required when using the flash (🕮 85).
- Using the flash at close range may cast a lens shadow. Zoom a little or have more distance from the subject.

4 Using the Flash (Super-Intelligent Flash)

When the flash is used, the camera's *Super-Intelligent Flash* system instantly analyzes the scene based on such factors as the brightness of the subject, its position in the frame, and its distance from the camera. Flash output and sensitivity are adjusted to ensure that the main subject is correctly exposed while preserving the effects of ambient background lighting, even in dimly-lit indoor scenes. Use the flash when lighting is poor, for example when shooting at night or indoors under low light.

1 Raise the flash. Press the flash pop-up button to raise the flash.



7 Choose a flash mode.

Press the selector right (\$). The flash mode changes each time the selector is pressed.



Mode	Description
AUTO/SP. (AUTO FLASH)	The flash fires when required. Recommended in most situations.

The flash may fire several times with each shot. Do not move the camera until shooting is complete.



- The peripheral part of an image may be dark when using the flash.
- Remove lens hoods to prevent shadows in photos taken with the flash.

Red-Eye Removal

When Intelligent Face Detection is active (\blacksquare 52), and **ON** is selected for **\bigcirc RED EYE REMOVAL** in the setup menu (\blacksquare 99), red-eye removal is available in R, $\textcircled{\Phi}$, and R.

Red-eye removal minimizes "red-eye" caused when light from the flash is reflected from the subject's retinas as shown in the illustration at right.



Turning the Flash Off

Lower the flash where flash photography is prohibited or to capture natural lighting under dim light. At slow shutter speeds, **15** will be displayed to warn that pictures may be blurred; use of a tripod is recommended.



Optional Flash Units

The camera can be used with optional EF-42 and EF-20 clip flash units (🕮 104).



If $\underline{\bullet}$ is selected for burst mode ($\underline{\blacksquare}$ 41), the camera will record burst of five photographs when the timer expires, improving your chances of getting the desired results in portraits taken with the self-timer.

Viewing Panoramas



Recording Movies

Press • to shoot a movie. During recording, the following indicators will be displayed and sound will be recorded via the built-in microphone (be careful not to cover the microphone during recording).



To end recording, press the ● button again. Recording ends automatically when the movie reaches maximum length or memory is full.



- Zoom can be adjusted while recording is in progress.
- If the subject is poorly lit, the AF-assist lamp may light to assist the focus operation.

 To turn the AF-assist lamp off, select **OFF** for **AF ILLUMINATOR** in the setup menu (■ 99).
- Exposure and white balance are adjusted automatically throughout recording. The color and brightness of the image may vary from that displayed before recording begins.
- Sounds made by the camera may be recorded.

Automatic Scene Selection

In mode, the camera selects the scene according to shooting conditions and the type of subject: (poorly-lit landscapes), (poorly-lit portraits), (andscapes), (close-ups), (backlit portraits), or **(other subjects)**.

Taking Photographs during Recording






Printing Pictures via USB



Creating a DPOF Print Order

The PRINT ORDER (DPOF) option in the playback menu can be used to create a digital "print order" for PictBridge-compatible printers (1103) or devices that support DPOF.


DPOF

DPOF (Digital Print Order Format) is a standard that allows pictures to be printed from "print orders" stored in internal memory or on a memory card. The information in the order includes the pictures to be printed, date imprint, and the number of copies of each picture.

■ WITH DATE _ /WITHOUT DATE

- **1** Select playback mode and press **MENU/OK** to display the playback menu.
- 2 Highlight PRINT ORDER (DPOF) and press MENU/OK.

Caring for the Camera

To ensure continued enjoyment of the product, observe the following precautions.

Storage and Use

If the camera will not be used for an extended period, remove the battery and memory card. Do not store or use the camera in locations that are:

- exposed to rain, steam, or smoke
- very humid or extremely dusty
- exposed to direct sunlight or very high temperatures, such as in a closed vehicle on a sunny day
- extremely cold
- subject to strong vibration
- exposed to strong magnetic fields, such as near a broadcasting antenna, power line, radar emitter, motor, transformer, or magnet
- in contact with volatile chemicals such as pesticides
- next to rubber or vinyl products

■ Water and Sand

Exposure to water and sand can also damage the camera and its internal circuitry and mechanisms. When using the camera at the beach or seaside, avoid exposing the camera to water or sand. Do not place the camera on a wet surface.

■ Condensation

Sudden increases in temperature, such as occur when entering a heated building on a cold day, can cause condensation inside the camera. If this occurs, turn the camera off and wait an hour before turning it on again. If condensation forms on the memory card, remove the card and wait for the condensation to dissipate.

Cleaning

Use a blower to remove dust from the lens and monitor, then gently wipe with a soft, dry cloth. Any remaining stains can be removed by wiping gently with a piece of FUJIFILM lens-cleaning paper to which a small amount of lens-cleaning fluid has been applied. Care should be taken to avoid scratching the lens or monitor. The camera body can be cleaned with a soft, dry cloth. Do not use alcohol, thinner, or other volatile chemicals.

Traveling

Keep the camera in your carry-on baggage. Checked baggage may suffer violent shocks that could damage the camera.
