

#### The Battery and Power Supply

**Note**: Check the type of battery used in your camera and read the appropriate sections.

The following describes the proper use of batteries and how to prolong their life. Incorrect use can shorten battery life or cause leakage, overheating, fire, or explosion.

#### Li-ion Batteries

Read this section if your camera uses a rechargeable Li-ion battery.

The battery is not charged at shipment. Charge the battery before use. Keep the battery in its case when not in use.

#### Notes on the Battery

The battery gradually loses its charge when not in use. Charge the battery one or two days before use.

Battery life can be extended by turning the camera off when not in use.

Battery capacity decreases at low temperatures; a depleted battery may not function at when cold. Keep a fully charged spare battery in a warm place and exchange as necessary, or keep the battery in your pocket or other warm place and insert it in the camera only when shooting. Do not place the battery in direct contact with hand warmers or other heating devices.

#### Charging the Battery

Charge the battery in the supplied battery charger. Charging times will increase at ambient temperatures below +10°C (+50°F) or above +35°C (+95°F). Do not attempt to charge the battery at temperatures above 40°C (+104°F); at temperatures below 0°C (+32°F), the battery will not charge.

Do not attempt to recharge a fully charged battery. The battery does not however need to be fully discharged before charging.

The battery may be warm to the touch immediately after charging or use. This is normal.

#### Battery Life

At normal temperatures, the battery can be recharged about 300 times. A noticeable decrease in the length of time the battery will hold a charge indicates that it has reached the end of its service life and should be replaced.

#### Storage

Performance may be impaired if the battery is left unused for extended periods when fully charged. Run the battery flat before storing it.

If the camera will not be used for an extended period, remove the battery and store it in a dry place with an ambient temperature of from  $+15^{\circ}$ C to  $+25^{\circ}$ C ( $+59^{\circ}$ F to  $+77^{\circ}$ F). Do not store in locations exposed to extremes of temperature.

#### Cautions: Handling the Battery

- Do not transport or store with metal objects such as necklaces or hairpins.
- · Do not expose to flame or heat.
- · Do not disassemble or modify.
- Use with designated chargers only.
- Dispose of used batteries promptly.
- · Do not drop or subject to strong physical shocks.
- · Do not expose to water.
- · Keep the terminals clean.
- The battery and camera body may become warm to the touch after extended use. This is normal.


#### AA Alkaline/Rechargeable Ni-MH Batteries

Read this section if your camera uses AA alkaline or rechargeable AA NI-MH batteries. Information on compatible battery types may be found elsewhere in the camera manual.

#### Cautions: Handling the Batteries

- Do not expose to water, flame, or heat, or store in warm or humid conditions.
- Do not transport or store with metal objects such as necklaces or hairpins.
- Do not disassemble or modify the batteries or battery casing.
- Do not subject to strong physical shocks.

- Do not use batteries that are leaking, deformed, or discolored.
- · Keep out of reach of infants and small children.
- · Insert in the correct orientation.
- Do not mix old and new batteries, batteries with different charge levels, or batteries of different types.
- If the camera will not be used for an extended period, remove the batteries. Note that the camera clock will be reset.
- The batteries may be warm to the touch immediately after use. Turn the camera off and allow the batteries to cool before handling.
- Battery capacity tends to decrease at low temperatures.
   Keep spare batteries in a pocket or other warm place and exchange as necessary. Cold batteries may recover some of their charge when warmed.
- Fingerprints and other stains on the battery terminals can impair battery performance. Thoroughly clean the terminals with a soft, dry cloth before inserting them in the camera.



If fluid from the battery comes into contact with skin

or clothing, flush the affected area with water. If fluid enters your eyes, immediately flush the affected area with water and seek medical attention. Do not rub your eyes. Failure to observe this precaution could result in permanent visual impairment.

#### Ni-MH Batteries

The capacity of Ni-MH batteries may be temporarily reduced when new, after long periods of disuse, or if they are repeatedly recharged before being fully discharged. This is normal and does not indicate a malfunction. Capacity can be increased by repeatedly discharging the batteries using the discharge option in the camera setup menu and recharging them using a battery charger.

 $\ensuremath{\textcircled{}}$  CAUTION: Do not use the discharge option with alkaline batteries.

The camera draws a small amount of current even when off. Ni-MH batteries that have been left in the camera for an extended period may be drawn down to the point that they no longer hold a charge. Battery performance may also drop if the batteries are run down in a device such as a flashlight. Use the discharge option in the camera setup menu to discharge Ni-MH batteries. Batteries that no longer hold a charge even after repeatedly being discharged and recharged have reached the end of their service life and must be replaced.

Ni-MH batteries can be recharged in a battery charger (sold separately). Batteries may become warm to the touch after charging. Refer to the instructions provided with the charger for more information. Use the charger with compatible batteries only.

Ni-MH batteries gradually lose their charge when not in use.

#### Disposal

Dispose of used batteries in accord with local regulations.

#### AC Power Adapters (Available Separately)

*This section applies to all camera models.* Use only FUJIFILM AC power adapters designated for use with this camera. Other adapters could damage the camera.

- The AC power adapter is for indoor use only.
- · Be sure the DC plug is securely connected to the camera.
- Turn the camera off before disconnecting the adapter. Disconnect the adapter by the plug, not the cable.
- Do not use with other devices.
- Do not disassemble.
- · Do not expose to high heat and humidity.
- Do not subject to strong physical shocks.
- The adapter may hum or become hot to the touch during use. This is normal.
- If the adapter causes radio interference, reorient or relocate the receiving antenna.

#### Using the Camera

- Do not aim the camera at extremely bright light sources, such as the sun in a cloudless sky. Failure to observe this precaution could damage the camera image sensor.
- Strong sunlight focused through the viewfinder may damage the panel of electronic viewfinder (EVF). Do not aim the electronic viewfinder at the sun.

#### Take Test Shots

Before taking photographs on important occasions (such as at weddings or before taking the camera on a trip), take a test shot and view the results to ensure that the camera is functioning normally. FUJIFILM Corporation can not accept liability for damages or lost profits incurred as a result of product malfunction.

#### Notes on Copyright

Unless intended solely for personal use, images recorded using your digital camera system cannot be used in ways that infringe copyright laws without the consent of the owner. Note that some restrictions apply to the photographing of stage performances, entertainments, and exhibits, even when intended purely for personal use. Users are also asked to note that the transfer of memory cards containing images or data protected under copyright laws is only permissible within the restrictions imposed by those copyright laws.

#### Handling

To ensure that images are recorded correctly, do not subject the camera to impact or physical shocks while images are being recorded.

#### Liquid Crystal

In the event that the display is damaged, care should be taken to avoid contact with liquid crystal. Take the urgent action indicated should any of the following situations arise:

- If liquid crystal comes in contact with your skin, clean the area with a cloth and then wash thoroughly with soap and running water.
- If liquid crystal enters your eyes, flush the affected eye with clean water for at least 15 minutes and then seek medical assistance.
- If liquid crystal is swallowed, rinse your mouth thoroughly with water. Drink large quantities of water and induce vomiting, then seek medical assistance.

Pictures are stored on optional SD, SDHC, and SDXC memory cards (💷 15), referred to in this manual as "memory cards."

### Caring for the Camera

For continued enjoyment of your camera, use a soft, dry cloth to clean the camera body after each use. Do not use alcohol, thinner, or other volatile chemicals, which could discolor or deform the leather on the camera body. Any liquid on the camera should be removed immediately with a soft, dry cloth. Use a blower to remove dust from the lens and monitor, then gently wipe with a soft, dry cloth. Any remaining stains can be removed by wiping gently with a piece of FUJIFILM lens-cleaning paper to which a small amount of lens-cleaning fluid has been applied. Care should be taken to avoid scratching the lens or monitor.





#### The Indicator Lamp


The indicator lamp shows camera status as follows:

Indicator lamp **Camera** status Ð Focus locked. Glows green Blinks green Blur, focus, or exposure warning. Picture can be taken. Blinks green and orange Recording pictures. Additional pictures can be taken. Glows orange Recording pictures. No additional pictures can be taken at this time. Flash charging; flash will not fire when picture is taken. Blinks orange Blinks red Lens or memory error. Warnings may also appear in the display (🕮 5).

#### The Command Dial

Rotate the command dial or press it up (①), right (②), down (③), or left (④) to highlight items and press **MENU/OK** (⑤) to select.



The command dial also serves as the following buttons: (1):  $\overleftarrow{\mathbf{m}}$  (delete) button ( $\overleftarrow{\mathbf{m}}$  28)/**AF** (autofocus) button ( $\overleftarrow{\mathbf{m}}$  48) (2):  $\mathbf{4}$  (flash) button ( $\overleftarrow{\mathbf{m}}$  29) (3): **WB** (white balance) button ( $\overleftarrow{\mathbf{m}}$  42)

(4): ♥ (macro) button (■ 31)


You can also rotate the command dial to choose a combination of shutter speed and aperture (program shift; 💷 36) or to adjust shutter speed in increments of ⅓ EV (≡ 37, 39).

#### Control Lock

To lock the **Q** button and prevent the command dial being used as an **AF**, flash, white balance, or macro button, press **MENU/OK** until **A** is displayed. This prevents accidental operation of these controls during shooting. The controls can be unlocked by pressing **MENU/OK** until **A** is no longer displayed.

#### The Command Control

Pressing the command control left or right performs the same function as rotating the command dial. It can also be used to choose a combination of shutter speed and aperture (program shift;  $\blacksquare$  36) or to adjust aperture in increments of  $V_3 EV$  ( $\blacksquare$  38, 39).



You can also press the center of the command control to zoom in on the focus area selected in the electronic viewfinder or LCD monitor, or to zoom in on the active focus point during playback or (if **CONTINUOUS** is selected for **I SCREEN SET-UP** > **IMAGE DISP.** in the setup menu; I 90) image review (press again to cancel zoom).


### Silent Mode

In situations in which camera sounds or lights may be unwelcome, press the **DISP/BACK** button until the ticon is displayed (about a second), or select **ON** for **SILENT MODE** in the setup menu (**S**88). The camera speaker, flash, and AF-assist illuminator/selftimer lamp turn off and flash and volume settings can not be adjusted (note that silent mode can not be enabled or disabled while movie playback is in progress). Press the **DISP/BACK** button again to resume normal operation.

#### <u>Camera Displays</u>

The following types of indicator may be displayed during shooting and playback. In the description that follows, all available indicators are shown for illustrative purposes; the indicators actually displayed vary with camera settings.



### **First Steps**

### Attaching the Strap

Attach the strap clips to the camera and then attach the strap.

### 1 Open a strap clip.

Use the clip attaching tool to open a strap clip, making sure that the tool and clip are in the orientations shown.



 ${\ensuremath{\mathbb O}}$  Keep the tool in a safe place. You will need it to open the strap clips when removing the strap.

### 2 Place the strap clip on an eyelet.

Hook the strap eyelet in the clip opening. Remove the tool, using the other hand to keep the clip in place.






**3** Pass the clip through the eyelet.

Rotate the clip fully through the eyelet until it clicks closed.



### **4** Attach a protective cover.

Place a protective cover over the eyelet as shown, with the black side of the cover toward the camera. Repeat Steps 1–4 for the second eyelet.



### 5 Insert the strap.

Insert the strap through a protective cover and strap clip.



### **6** Fasten the strap.

Fasten the strap as shown. Repeat Steps 5–6 for the second eyelet.




 $\ensuremath{\mathbbm O}$  To avoid dropping the camera, be sure the strap is correctly secured.

### Charging the Battery

The battery is not charged at shipment. Charge the battery before use.

### **1** Place the battery in the charger.

Insert the battery in the orientation indicated by the  $\ominus \oplus \oplus$  labels.



The camera uses an NP-95 rechargeable battery.

 Attach the supplied adapter before charging the battery (the adapter is attached at shipment).



### 2 Plug the charger in.

Plug the charger into a power outlet. The charging indicator will light.

#### The Charging Indicator

The charging indicator shows battery charge status as follows:

Charging indicator	Battery status	Action
Off	Battery not inserted.	Insert the battery.

### **3** Charge the battery.

Remove the battery when charging is complete. See the specifications (🗐 123) for charging times (note that charging times increase at low temperatures).


 $\ensuremath{\textcircled{}}$  Unplug the charger when it is not in use.

### Inserting the Battery and a Memory Card

Although the camera can store pictures in internal memory, optional SD, SDHC, and SDXC memory cards (sold separately) can be used to store additional pictures. After charging the battery, insert the battery and memory card as described below.

### **1** Open the battery-chamber cover.


Slide the battery-chamber latch as shown and open the battery-chamber cover.



- ① Do not open the battery-chamber cover when the camera is on. Failure to observe this precaution could damage image files or memory cards.
- $\ensuremath{\mathbbm O}$  Do not use excessive force when handling the battery-chamber cover.

### 2 Insert the battery.


Align the orange stripe on the battery with the orange battery latch and slide the battery into the camera, keeping the battery latch pressed to one side. Confirm that the battery is securely latched.




① Insert the battery in the correct orientation. Do not use force or attempt to insert the battery upside down or backwards. The battery will slide in easily in the correct orientation.

### **3** Insert the memory card.

Holding the memory card in the orientation shown at right, slide it in until it clicks into place at the back of the slot



- Be sure card is in the correct orientation: do not insert at an angle or use force. If the memory card is not correctly inserted or no memory card is inserted, in will appear in the display and internal memory will be used for recording and playback.
- ① SD/SDHC/SDXC memory cards can be locked, making it impossible to format the card or to record or delete images.



Before inserting a memory card, slide the writeprotect switch to the unlocked position.

### 4 Close the battery-chamber cover.

Slide the battery-chamber latch as shown and close the battery-chamber cover.



#### Removing the Battery and Memory Card

Before removing the battery or memory card, *turn the camera off* and open the battery-chamber cover.

To remove the battery, press the battery latch to the side, and slide the battery out of the camera as shown.



Battery latch

To remove the memory card, press it in and release it slowly. The card can then be removed by hand. When a memory card is removed, the card could be

ejected too quickly. Use your finger to hold it and gently release the card.

#### ① Batteries

- Remove dirt from the battery terminals with a clean, dry cloth. Failure to observe this precaution could prevent the battery from charging.
- Do not affix stickers or other objects to the battery. Failure to observe this precaution could make it impossible to remove the battery from the camera.
- Do not short the battery terminals. The battery could overheat.
- Read the cautions in "The Battery and Power Supply" (  $\boxdot$  iv).
- Use only battery chargers designated for use with the battery. Failure to observe this precaution could result in product malfunction.
- Do not remove the labels from the battery or attempt to split or peel the outer casing.
- The battery gradually loses its charge when not in use. Charge the battery one or two days before use.

First Steps

### Compatible Memory Cards

FUJIFILM and SanDisk SD, SDHC, and SDXC memory cards have been approved for use in the camera. A complete list of approved memory cards is available at *http://www.fujifilm.com/support/digital\_cameras/compatibility/*. Operation is not guaranteed with other cards. The camera can not be used with *xD-Picture Cards* or **M**ulti**M**edia**C**ard (MMC) devices.

#### ① Memory Cards

- Do not turn the camera off or remove the memory card while the memory card is being formatted or data are being recorded to or deleted from the card. Failure to observe this precaution could damage the card.
- Format memory cards before first use, and be sure to reformat all memory cards after using them in a computer or other device. For more information on formatting memory cards, see page 92.
- Memory cards are small and can be swallowed; keep out of reach of children. If a child swallows a memory card, seek medical assistance immediately.
- miniSD or microSD adapters that are larger or smaller than the standard dimensions of an SD/SDHC/SDXC card
  may not eject normally; if the card does not eject, take the camera to an authorized service representative. Do
  not forcibly remove the card.
- Do not affix labels to memory cards. Peeling labels can cause camera malfunction.
- Movie recording may be interrupted with some types of SD/SDHC/SDXC memory card. Use a **CLASS** card or better when shooting HD movies.
- The data in internal memory may be erased or corrupted when the camera is repaired. Please note that the repairer will be able to view pictures in internal memory.
- Formatting a memory card in the camera creates a folder in which pictures are stored. Do not rename or delete this folder or use a computer or other device to edit, delete, or rename image files. Always use the camera to delete pictures; before editing or renaming files, copy them to a computer and edit or rename the copies, not the originals. Renaming the files on the camera can cause problems during playback.

Rotate the ON/OFF switch to ON to turn the camera on. Select OFF to turn the camera off.

- Press the button to start playback. Press the shutter button halfway to return to shooting mode.
- The camera will turn off automatically if no operations are performed for the length of time selected for DOWER MANAGEMENT > AUTO POWER OFF (D) 91). To reactivate the camera after it has turned off automatically, press the shutter button halfway or turn the ON/OFF switch to OFF and then back to ON.
- For information on other power saving and startup options, see page 91.
- ① Fingerprints and other marks on the lens or viewfinder can affect pictures or the view through the viewfinder. Keep the lens and viewfinder clean.

### **Basic Setup**

A language-selection dialog is displayed the first time the camera is turned on. Set up the camera as described below (you can reset the clock or change languages at any time using the ③ DATE/ TIME or 1 言語/LANG. options in the setup menu; for information on displaying the setup menu, see page 88).

### 1 Choose a language.



- Highlight a language and press MENU/OK.
- Press DISP/BACK to skip the current step. Any steps you skip will be displayed the next time the camera is turned on.

### 2 Set the date and time.




Press the command dial left or right to highlight the year, month, day, hour, or minute and press up or down to change. To change the order in which the year, month, and day are displayed, highlight the date format and press the command dial up or down. Press **MENU/OK** to exit to shooting mode when settings are complete.





### Choosing a Display

The camera is equipped with a hybrid optical/electronic viewfinder (OVF/EVF) and an LCD monitor (LCD). Press **VIEW MODE** to choose a display.






#### Automatic Display Selection

The viewfinder turns on automatically when you put your eye to the viewfinder, and the LCD monitor turns on when you take your eye away (note that the eye sensor may respond to objects other than your eye or to light shining directly on the sensor).



#### Focusing the Viewfinder

The camera is equipped with diopter adjustment in the range -2 to +1 m<sup>-1</sup> to accommodate individual differences in vision. Rotate the diopter adjustment control until the viewfinder display is in sharp focus.

### **Adjusting Display Brightness**

The brightness of the viewfinder and LCD monitor can be adjusted using the SCREEN SET-UP > EVF/LCD BRIGHTNESS option in the setup menu ( 2 90).

### **Bright Ambient Lighting**

Bright Ambient LightingFirstReflections and glare caused by bright ambientlighting may make it hard to see the display in<br/>the monitor, particularly when the camera is used outdoors. This can be addressed by holding the Q button to trigger outdoor mode. Outdoor mode can also be enabled using the SCREEN SET-UP > MONITOR SUNLIGHT MODE option in the setup menu (🕮 90).

#### **Using the Hybrid Viewfinder**

Use the viewfinder selector to choose between optical and electronic viewfinders.



Optical viewfinder (OVF)	This display is immune from digital video effects and allows the subject to be viewed directly with no display lag. Subjects are always in focus, allowing you to check their expression at any time, while a field of view slightly larger than that of the lens makes it easier to locate your subject without re- moving your eye from the viewfinder. The viewfinder window is however at a slight distance from the lens, with the result that the display in the viewfinder may differ slightly from the final photograph due to parallax.
Electronic viewfinder (EVF)	This display shows the view through the lens and has exactly the same field of view, allowing you to frame your subjects pre- cisely and preview focus, depth of field, ex- posure, and white balance (although there may be a slight display lag). It can also be used to view photographs after shooting.
LCD monitor	This display is identical to the electronic viewfinder, except that its large size makes it easier to view shooting indicators and the view through the lens. It may however be difficult to see in bright light.

### The DISP/BACK Button





#### Histograms


Histograms show the distribution of tones in the image. Brightness is shown by the horizontal axis, the number of pixels by the vertical axis.



**Optimal exposure**: Pixels are distributed in an even curve throughout the tone range.

**Overexposed**: Pixels are clustered on the right side of the graph.

**Underexposed**: Pixels are clustered on the left side of the graph.




## Taking Photographs

This section describes how to take pictures using program AE (mode **P**). For information on **S**, **A**, and **M** modes, see page 36.

## 1 Select program AE.

Set shutter speed and aperture to **A** (shutter speed is set by rotating the shutter speed dial). **P** will appear in the display.




#### The Q Button

The **Q** button can be used to view and adjust camera settings (🕮 34).

## 2 Select single AF.

Rotate the focus mode selector to **AF-S** (🕮 46).



# **3** Ready the camera.

Hold the camera steady with both hands and brace your elbows against your sides. Shaking or unsteady hands can blur your shots.

To prevent pictures that are out of focus or too dark (underexposed), keep your fingers and other objects away from the lens, flash, and AE-assist illuminator





#### 4 Focus.

Frame the picture with your subject in the center of the display and press the shutter button halfway to focus.

♦ If the subject is poorly lit, the AF-assist illuminator may light (▦ 78).

If the camera is able to focus, it will beep twice and focus area will glow green. Focus and exposure will lock while the shutter button is pressed halfway.

If the camera is unable to focus, the focus frame will turn red, and **!AF** will be displayed. If the subject is close to the camera, select macro mode and try again (🕮 31).

## 5 Shoot.

Smoothly press the shutter button the rest of the way down to take the picture.





# Basic Photography and Playback

## **Viewing Pictures**

#### Viewing Pictures Full Frame

Pictures can be viewed in the viewfinder or LCD monitor. When taking important pictures, take a test shot and check the results.

To view pictures full frame, press  $\blacktriangleright$ .

Additional pictures can be viewed by rotating the command dial or pressing it left or right. Press or rotate right to view pictures in the order recorded, left to view pictures in reverse order. Keep the dial pressed to scroll rapidly to the desired frame.

#### Favorites: Rating Pictures


To rate the current picture, press **DISP/BACK** and press the command dial up and down to select from zero to five stars.



#### Viewing Photo Information

Photo information can be viewed by pressing the command control right.





Rotate the command dial to view other images.

#### Zooming in on the Focus Point

Press the center of the command control to zoom in on the focus point. Press the center of the command control again to return to full-frame playback.





## Playback Zoom

Press **Q** to zoom in on the current picture, **Q** to zoom out. When the picture is zoomed in, the command dial can be used to view areas of the image not currently visible in the display. Press **DISP/BACK** or **MENU/OK** to exit zoom.




Navigation window shows portion of image currently displayed

#### Multi-Frame Playback

To change the number of images displayed, press  ${f Q}$  when a picture is displayed full frame.



Use the command dial to highlight images and press **MENU/OK** to view the highlighted image full frame. In the nine- and hundred-frame displays, press the command dial up or down to view more pictures.

## **Deleting Pictures**

To delete individual pictures, multiple selected pictures, or all pictures, press the command dial up ( $\mathbf{m}$ ), and choose from the options below. *Note that deleted pictures can not be recovered. Copy important pictures to a computer or other storage device before proceeding.* 




Option	Description
FRAME	Press the command dial left or right to scroll through pictures and press <b>MENU/OK</b> to delete the current picture (a confirmation dialog is not displayed).
SELECTED FRAMES	Highlight pictures and press <b>MENU/OK</b> to select or deselect (pictures in photobooks or print orders are shown by <b>II</b> ). When the operation is complete, press <b>DISP/BACK</b> to display a confirmation dialog, then highlight <b>OK</b> and press <b>MENU/OK</b> to delete the selected pictures.
ALL FRAMES	A confirmation dialog will be displayed; highlight <b>OK</b> and press <b>MENU/OK</b> to delete all unprotected pictures (if a memory card is inserted, only the pictures on the memory card will be affected; the pictures in internal memory are only deleted if no memory card is inserted). Pressing <b>DISP/BACK</b> cancels deletion; note that any pictures deleted before the button was pressed can not be recovered.

Pictures can also be deleted by 🛅 **ERASE** from playback menu.

If a message appears stating that the selected images are part of a DPOF print order, press MENU/OK to delete the pictures. Use the built-in flash for additional lighting when shooting at night or indoors under low light.

To choose a flash mode, press the command dial right (\$) to display the following options, then rotate the dial or press it left or right to highlight an option and press **MENU/OK** to select.



\* Red-eye removal (இ, @\$, or இ) is available in these modes when ON is selected for I RED EYE REMOVAL in the shooting menu (□ 79). Red-eye removal minimizes "*red-eye*" caused when light from the flash is reflected from the subject's retinas as shown in the illustration at right.





- Except in commander mode, the flash may fire several times with each shot. Do not move the camera until shooting is complete.
- Remove lens hoods to prevent shadows in photos taken with the flash.

#### Flash Sync Speed

The flash will synchronize with the shutter at shutter speeds of ½000 s or slower.

#### Optional Flash Units

The camera can also be used with optional FUJIFILM shoe-mounted flash units. Do not use third-party flash units that apply over high voltages to the camera hot shoe.

# Macro Mode (Close-ups)

To focus at distances as close as 10 cm/4in., press the command dial left (\*) and select \*. If the optical viewfinder is on, the camera will automatically switch to the electronic viewfinder (because of parallax, the camera will not focus at distances of less than 80 cm/2.6 ft. when the optical viewfinder is used). To exit macro mode, press the command dial left and select **OFF**.

- The LCD monitor and electronic viewfinder can be used to focus at short ranges when macro mode is not selected, but the time needed to focus increases.
- The shadow cast by the lens may appear in photographs taken with the flash at distances under 50 cm/19.6 in. Turn the flash off or increase the distance to the subject.





# **Recording High-Definition (HD) Movies**

The camera can be used to record short high-definition movies. Sound is recorded in stereo via the built-in microphone; during recording, do not cover the microphone or use the viewfinder selector, which is located next to the microphone.

1 Set aperture to A.



2 Press the DRIVE button to display drive options. Press the command dial up or down to highlight ₽ (MOVIE) and press MENU/OK.





**3** Press the shutter button all the way down to start recording.



**4** Press the shutter button all the way down again to end recording. Recording ends automatically or when memory is full.



- Exposure and white balance are adjusted automatically throughout recording. The color and brightness of the image may vary from those displayed before recording begins.
- The indicator lamp lights while movies are being recorded.
- ① The microphone may pick up lens noise and other sounds made by the camera during recording.
- ${\rm \textcircled{O}}$  Vertical or horizontal streaks may appear in movies containing very bright subjects. This is normal and does not indicate a malfunction.
- $\ensuremath{\mathbbm O}$  If the optical viewfinder is on, the camera will automatically switch to the electronic viewfinder.

## 🐌 The Q Button

The **Q** button can be used to view and adjust camera settings (🕮 34).

# Viewing Movies

During playback, movies are displayed as shown at right. The following operations *Movie icon* can be performed while a movie is displayed:

Operation	Description
Start/pause playback	<b>Press the command dial down</b> to start playback. Press again to pause. While playback is paused, you can press the command dial left or right to rewind or advance one frame at a time.
End playback	Press the command dial up to end playback.

Adjust volume	<b>Press MENU/OK</b> to pause playback and display volume controls. Press the command dial up or down to adjust the volume; press <b>MENU/OK</b> again to resume playback. Volume can also be adjusted using the <b>CO PLAYBACK VOLUME</b> option in the playback menu ( <b>ED</b> 86).

Progress is shown in the display during playback.



# More on Photography and Playback

## Choosing an Exposure Mode

The camera offers a choice of program AE ( $\mathbf{P}$ ), shutter-priority AE ( $\mathbf{S}$ ), aperture-priority AE ( $\mathbf{A}$ ), and manual exposure ( $\mathbf{M}$ ) modes.

#### Program AE (P)

To allow the camera to adjust both shutter speed and aperture for optimal exposure, rotate the aperture ring and shutter speed dial to **A**. **P** will appear in the display.


① If the subject is outside the metering range of the camera, the shutter speed and aperture displays will show "---".

#### Program Shift

If desired, you can rotate the command dial or press the command control left or right to choose other combinations of shutter speed and aperture without altering exposure (program shift). Program shift is not available when a flash is used, **AUTO** is selected for **DYNAMIC RANGE** in the shooting menu (**1**73), or an auto option is selected for **1**1 **ISO** in the shooting menu (**1**44).





## Shutter-Priority AE (S)

To adjust shutter speed manually while letting the camera select aperture for optimal exposure, rotate the aperture ring to **A** and use the shutter speed dial. **S** will appear in the display.

- ${\rm \oplus}~$  If the correct exposure can not be achieved at the selected shutter speed, aperture will be displayed in red when the shutter button is pressed halfway. Adjust shutter speed until the correct exposure is achieved.
- ${\rm \@Delta}$  If the subject is outside the metering range of the camera, the aperture display will show "---".
- Shutter speed can also be adjusted in increments of <sup>1</sup>/<sub>3</sub> EV by rotating the command dial.






### Aperture-Priority AE (A)

To adjust aperture manually while letting the camera select shutter speed for optimal exposure, rotate the shutter speed dial to A and adjust aperture. A will appear in the display.

- ① If the correct exposure can not be achieved at the selected aperture, the shutter speed will be displayed in red when the shutter button is pressed halfway. Adjust aperture until the correct exposure is achieved
- ① If the subject is outside the metering range of the camera, the shutter speed display will show "---".
- ① The slowest shutter speed available when **ON** is selected for **W OVF POWER SAVE MODE** is 1/4 s (1) 91).
- Aperture can also be adjusted in increments of 1/3 EV by pressing the command control left or right.


## Previewing Depth of Field

When S PREVIEW DEPTH OF FIELD is selected for I Fn BUTTON (I 69) in the shooting menu, pressing the **Fn** button stops aperture down to the selected setting, allowing depth of field to be previewed in the viewfinder or LCD monitor.









#### <u>Manual Exposure (M)</u>

Exposure can be altered from the value suggested by the camera by rotating both the shutter speed dial and aperture ring to settings other than **A**. **M** will appear in the display.


The command dial and command control can be used to adjust shutter speed and aperture by ±2/3 EV from the selected value in steps of 1/3 EV. Use the command dial to adjust shutter speed, the command control to adjust aperture.





Command control

The manual exposure display includes an exposure indicator that shows the amount the picture would be under- or over-exposed at current settings.





#### Shutter Speed and Aperture

Because the camera uses a lens-internal shutter, fast shutter speeds may not be available at large apertures. If the selected combination of shutter speed and aperture is unavailable, shutter speed or aperture will be displayed in red and the desired exposure may not be achieved.

## Long Time-Exposures (T/B)

Select a shutter speed of **T** (time) or **B** (bulb) for long time-exposures.

- Use of a tripod is recommended to prevent the camera from moving during the exposure.
- To reduce "noise" (mottling) in long time-exposures, select ON for LONG EXPOSURE NR in the shooting menu (174). Note that this may increase the time needed to record images after shooting.


## <u>Time (T)</u>



#### 🖢 📮 : Custom White Balance

Choose 📮 to adjust white balance for unusual lighting conditions. White balance measurement options will be displayed; frame a white object so that it fills the display and press the shutter button all the way down to measure white balance (to select the most recent custom value and exit without measuring white balance, press **DISP/BACK**, or press **MENU/OK** to select the most recent value and display the fine-tuning dialog).

• If "COMPLETED!" is displayed, press MENU/OK to set white balance to the measured value.

- If "UNDER" is displayed, raise exposure compensation (🕮 51) and try again.
- If "OVER" is displayed, lower exposure compensation (🕮 51) and try again.

#### Color Temperature

Color temperature is an objective measure of the color of a light source, expressed in Kelvin (K). Light sources with a color temperature close to that of direct sunlight appear white; light sources with a lower color temperature have a yellow or red cast, while those with a higher color temperature are tinged with blue. You can match color temperature to the light source as shown in the following table, or choose options that differ sharply from the color of the light source to make pictures "warmer" or "colder."

## Sensitivity

"Sensitivity" refers to the camera's sensitivity to light. Choose from values between 200 and 6400, or select L (100), H (12800), or H (25600) for special situations. Higher values can be used to reduce blur when lighting is poor, while lower values allow slower shutter speeds or wider apertures in bright light; note, however, that mottling may appear in pictures taken at high sensitivities, particularly at H (25600), while choosing L (100) reduces dynamic range. Values of from ISO 200 to ISO 6400 are recommended in most situations. If an AUTO option is selected, the camera will adjust sensitivity automatically in response to shooting conditions; the value in parentheses is the maximum sensitivity that will be selected when the subject is poorly lit.

- 1 Press MENU/OK in shooting mode to display the shooting menu. Press the command dial up or down to highlight ISO and press MENU/OK.
  - At default settings, ISO options can also be displayed by pressing the Fn button.
- 2 Press the command dial up or down to highlight the desired option and press **MENU/OK** to select.

- Sensitivity is not reset when the camera is turned off.
- ▶ L (100) is reset to ISO 200 and H (12800) and H (25600) are reset to ISO 6400 when RAW, FINE+RAW, or NORMAL+RAW is selected for image quality (■ 73). For more information on the settings available with L (100), H (12800), and H (25600), see page 125.


The camera automatically chooses a sensitivity between the default and maximum values. Sensitivity is only raised above the default value if the shutter speed required for optimal exposure would be slower than the value selected for **MIN. SHUTTER SPEED**.

- If the value selected for DEFAULT SENSITIVITY is higher than that selected for MAX. SENSITIVITY, DEFAULT SENSITIVITY will be set to the value selected for MAX. SENSITIVITY.
- The camera may select shutter speeds slower than MIN. SHUTTER SPEED if pictures would still be underexposed at the value selected for MAX. SENSITIVITY.


# Focus Mode

Use the focus mode selector to choose how the camera focuses.

- **AF-S** (single AF): Focus locks while the shutter button is pressed halfway. Choose for stationary subjects.
- **AF-C** (continuous AF): Focus is continually adjusted to reflect changes in the distance to the subject even when the shutter button is not pressed halfway (note that this increases the drain on the battery).



• **MF** (manual): Focus manually using the lens focus ring. Rotate the ring left to reduce the focus distance, right to increase. The manual focus indicator indicates how closely the focus distance matches the distance to the subject in the focus brackets (the red bar indicates the focus distance, the white bar the depth of field, or in other words the distance in front of and behind the focus point that appears to be in focus); you can also check focus visually in the viewfinder or LCD monitor. Choose for manual control of focus or in situations in which the camera is unable to focus using autofocus (🖽 50).





- ♥ Use the I FOCUS RING option in the setup menu (I 89) to reverse the direction of rotation of the focus ring.
- The camera will not focus if the focus ring is rotated past infinity.
- To focus using autofocus, press the AFL/AEL button. This can be used to quickly focus on a chosen subject in manual focus mode.
- The camera can show focus distance in meters or feet. Use the meters SCALE UNITS option in the setup menu (19 89) to choose the units used.

## MF Assist

The **MF ASSIST** option in the setup menu can be used to check focus when pictures are framed in the LCD monitor or electronic viewfinder.

The Image MF ASSIST menu can be displayed by pressing and holding the center of the command control.

The following options are available:

- FOCUS PEAK HIGHLIGHT: Highlights high-contrast outlines. Rotate the focus ring until the subject is highlighted.
- **DIGITAL SPLIT IMAGE**: Displays a split, black-and-white image in the center of the frame. Frame the subject in the split-image area and rotate the focus ring until the three parts of the split image are correctly aligned.

#### Manual Focus: Checking Focus

If **ON** is selected for **IF FOCUS CHECK** in the setup menu (**E** 89), rotating the focus ring automatically magnifies the view in the electronic viewfinder or LCD monitor for precise focus. To scroll to other areas of the frame, press the **AF** button and rotate the command dial.

The magnification varies depending on whether STANDARD or FOCUS PEAK HIGHLIGHT/DIGITAL SPLIT IMAGE is selected for III MF ASSIST.









#### Focus Frame Selection

When AREA is selected for AF MODE in the shooting menu and AF-S is selected for focus mode, the electronic viewfinder and LCD monitor offer a choice of 49 focus points and the optical viewfinder a choice of 25, allowing photographs to be composed with the main subject positioned almost anywhere in the frame. To position the focus frame, press the AF button and then use the command dial (the focus frame can be returned to the center by pressing DISP/BACK). Press MENU/OK when the focus frame is in the desired position.

 $\ensuremath{\mathbb O}$  When you switch to the optical viewfinder, the camera will select the focus frame closest to that selected in the electronic viewfinder or LCD monitor.

When framing pictures in the electronic viewfinder or LCD monitor, you can choose the size of the focus frame for **AF-S** by pressing the **AF** button and then pressing the command control left or right. Press the control left to reduce the frame by up to 50%, right to enlarge it by up to 150%. Press **MENU/OK** when the frame is the desired size.





# Focus/Exposure Lock

To compose photographs with off-center subjects:

- **1 Focus**: Position the subject in the focus frame and press the shutter button halfway to lock focus and exposure. Focus and exposure will remain locked while the shutter button is pressed halfway (AF/AE lock).
  - Depending on the option selected for B AE/AF-LOCK BUTTON in the shooting menu (I 78), focus and/ or exposure can also be locked by pressing the AFL/AEL button; focus and/or exposure will remain locked even when the shutter button is pressed halfway. Choose AE LOCK ONLY to lock exposure but not focus, AF LOCK ONLY to lock focus but not exposure, or AE/AF LOCK to lock both focus and exposure. Regardless of the option selected, the AFL/AEL button can not be used to lock exposure in manual focus mode (I 46).
- **2 Recompose**: Keep the shutter button pressed halfway or keep the **AFL/AEL** button pressed.
  - If AE&AF ON/OFF SWITCH is selected for AE/AF-LOCK MODE (■ 78), focus and/or exposure lock when the AFL/AEL button is pressed and remain locked until the button is pressed again.
- **3 Shoot**: Press the button all the way down.







#### Autofocus

Although the camera boasts a high-precision autofocus system, it may be unable to focus on the subjects listed below.

• Very shiny subjects such as mirrors or car bodies.

• Fast-moving subjects.


- Subjects photographed through a window or other reflective object.
- Dark subjects and subjects that absorb rather than reflect light, such as hair or fur.
- Insubstantial subjects, such as smoke or flame.
- Subjects that show little contrast with the background (for example, subjects in clothing that is the same color as the background).
- Subjects positioned in front of or behind a high-contrast object that is also in the focus frame (for example, a subject photographed against a backdrop of highly contrasting elements).



## **Exposure Compensation**

Rotate the exposure compensation dial to adjust exposure when photographing very bright, very dark, or high-contrast subjects. The effect is visible in the LCD monitor and electronic viewfinder; when using the optical viewfinder, use the exposure indicator to check exposure.

## Exposure Value (EV)

The exposure value is determined by the sensitivity of the image sensor and the amount of light to which the sensor is exposed. Doubling the amount increases EV by one, while halving it reduces EV by one. The amount of light entering the camera can be controlled by adjusting aperture and shutter speed.

- Choosing an Exposure Compensation Value
- Backlit subjects: Choose values from  $+\frac{2}{3}$  EV to  $+\frac{12}{3}$  EV.



# Metering

To choose how the camera meters exposure, press the **AE** button to display metering options. Use the command dial to highlight an option and press **AE** to select.

Mode	Description
(MULTI)	The camera instantly determines exposure based on an analysis of composition, color, and brightness distribution. Recommended in most situations.
(SPOT)	The camera meters lighting conditions in an area at the center of the frame equivalent to 2% of the total. Recommended with backlit subjects and in other cases in which the background is much brighter or darker than the main subject.
C] (AVERAGE)	Exposure is set to the average for the entire frame. Provides consistent exposure across multiple shots with the same lighting, and is particularly effective for landscapes and portraits of subjects dressed in black or white.







- To return to Step 2 and retake the first shot, press the command dial left. To save the first shot and exit without creating a multiple exposure, press DISP/BACK.
- 5 Take the second shot.




6 Press **MENU/OK** to create the multiple exposure, or press the command dial left to return to Step 4 and retake the second shot.



# Continuous Shooting (Burst Mode)

Capture motion in a series of pictures.

**1** Press the **DRIVE** button to display drive options. Press the command dial up or down to highlight **(**CONTINUOUS), and the options shown below will be displayed.





- 2 Press the command dial right or left to choose from frame rates of approximately 6.0 fps (frames per second) and 3.0 fps. Press MENU/OK to proceed when settings are complete.
- **3** Press the shutter button halfway to focus.



**4** Press the shutter button the rest of the way down to start shooting. Shooting ends when the shutter button is released, the selected number of pictures has been taken, or the memory card is full.



- Focus and exposure are determined by the first frame in each series. The flash turns off automatically; the previously-selected flash mode is restored when burst shooting is turned off.
- Frame rate varies with shutter speed and may slow as more shots are taken.
- Additional time may be required to record pictures when shooting ends.
- ▶ If file numbering reaches 999 before shooting is complete, the remaining pictures will be recorded to a new folder (🕮 89).
- In some drive modes, shooting may not begin if the space available on the memory card is insufficient.

# Viewing Pictures Taken in a Single Burst

When a picture taken in continuous shooting mode is displayed full-frame, the first picture in the current burst can be viewed by pressing the command dial down (burst mode playback). Press the command dial right to view pictures in the order recorded, left to view pictures in reverse order. Keep the command dial pressed to scroll rapidly to the desired frame. To exit, press **DISP/BACK**.

- Pressing the command dial right when the last picture in the burst is displayed displays the first picture in the burst; similarly, pressing the command dial left when the first picture is displayed displays the last picture.
- Deletion (

  \$\Box\$ 82) operations applied during burst mode playback apply only to the current picture. In contrast, if these operations are performed when a picture taken in continuous shooting mode is displayed in full-frame playback, all images in the same burst will be affected.



# Panoramas

Follow an on-screen guide to create a panorama.

1 Press the **DRIVE** button to display drive options. Press the command dial up or down to highlight **Field** (MOTION PANORAMA) and press **MENU/OK**.




- **2** To select the size of the angle through which you will pan the camera while shooting, press the command dial left. Highlight a size and press **MENU/OK**.
- **3** Press the command dial right to view a choice of pan directions. Highlight a pan direction and press **MENU/OK**.



**4** Press the shutter button all the way down to start recording. There is no need to keep the shutter button pressed during recording.

**5** Pan the camera in the direction shown by the arrow. Shooting ends automatically when the camera is panned to the end of the guides and the panorama is complete.



Shooting ends if the shutter button is pressed all the way down during shooting. No panorama may be recorded if the shutter button is pressed before the panorama is complete.

The size of the completed panorama varies with the angle and pan direction.

Panoramas

- Panoramas are created from multiple frames; exposure for the entire panorama is determined by the first frame. The camera may in some cases record an greater or lesser angle than selected or be unable to stitch the frames together perfectly. The last part of the panorama may not be recorded if shooting ends before the panorama is complete.
- Shooting may be interrupted if the camera is panned too quickly or too slowly. Panning the camera in a direction other than that shown cancels shooting.
- ① The desired results may not be achieved with moving subjects, subjects close to the camera, unvarying subjects such as the sky or a field of grass, subjects that are in constant motion, such as waves and waterfalls, or subjects that undergo marked changes in brightness. Panoramas may be blurred if the subject is poorly lit.

#### For Best Results

For best results, prop your elbows against your sides and move the camera slowly in a small circle at a steady speed, keeping the camera horizontal and being careful only to pan in the direction shown by the guides. Use a tripod for best results. If the desired results are not achieved, try panning at a different speed.

#### Viewing Panoramas

In full-frame playback, panoramas can be played back using the command dial. Press the command dial down to start playback and press again to pause. While playback is paused, you can scroll the panorama manually be pressing the command dial left or right. To exit to full-frame playback, press the command dial up.



# **Recording Pictures in RAW Format**

To toggle RAW image quality on or off for a single shot, assign **RAW** to the **Fn** button (🗐 69). If a JPEG option is currently selected for image quality, pressing the **Fn** button temporarily selects the equivalent JPEG+RAW option. If a JPEG+RAW option is currently selected, pressing the **Fn** button temporarily selects the equivalent JPEG option, while if

**RAW** is selected, pressing the **Fn** button temporarily selects **FINE**. Taking a picture or pressing the **Fn** button again restores the previous setting.

- RAW images record raw, unprocessed data from the camera image sensor. JPEG copies of RAW images can be created using the RAW CONVERSION option in the playback menu, or RAW images can be viewed on a computer using the RAW FILE CONVERTER application that is installed with the software on the supplied CD (
  94, 95).
- Sensitivities of L (100), H (12800), and H (25600) are not available when RAW image quality is on (🕮 44).

# **Creating JPEG Copies of RAW Pictures**

RAW pictures store information on camera settings separately from the data captured by the camera image sensor. Using the **RAW CONVERSION** option in the playback menu, you can create JPEG copies of RAW pictures using different options for the settings listed below. The original image data are unaffected, allowing a single RAW image to be processed in a multitude of different ways.

- 1 Press **MENU/OK** during playback to display the playback menu, then press the command dial up or down to highlight **CONVER-SION** and press **MENU/OK** to display the settings listed in the table at right.
  - These options can also be displayed by pressing
     Q during playback.
- **2** Press the command dial up or down to highlight a setting and press the command dial right to select. Press the command dial up



or down to highlight the desired option and press **MENU/OK** to select and return to the settings list. Repeat this step to adjust additional settings.

# The ND Filter

The camera is equipped with a **N**eutral **D**ensity (ND) filter that reduces exposure by the equivalent of 3 EV. This allows slower shutter speeds or wider apertures to be used with brightly lit subjects, making it possible to blur motion or soften background details without risk of overexposure.

1 Press **MENU/OK** in shooting mode to display the shooting menu. Press the command dial up or down to highlight **D FILTER** and press **MENU/OK**.

2 Press the command dial up or down to highlight ON and press MENU/OK to select.



# Depth of Field

Aperture can be set manually for movie recording by selecting an aperture other than **A** for aperture-priority AE. Adjust aperture before recording begins. Choose low f-numbers to soften background details. The effect can be heightened by increasing the distance between your subject and the background.







#### Connecting the Camera

- 1 If the pictures you wish to copy are stored on a memory card, insert the card into the camera (🕮 12).
  - Windows users may require the Windows CD when starting the software for the first time.

For more information on using the supplied software, start the application and select the appropriate option from the **Help** menu.

- ① If a memory card containing a large number of images is inserted, there may be a delay before the software starts and you may be unable to import or save images. Use a memory card reader to transfer pictures.
- ① Make sure that the computer does not display a message stating that copying is in progress and that the indicator lamp is out before turning the camera off or disconnecting the USB cable (if the number of images copied is very large, the indicator lamp may remain lit after the message has cleared from the computer display). Failure to observe this precaution could result in loss of data or damage to internal memory or the memory card.
- $\ensuremath{\textcircled{}}$  Disconnect the camera before inserting or removing memory cards.
- $\oplus$  In some cases, it may not be possible to access pictures saved to a network server using the supplied software in the same way as on a standalone computer.
- ① The user bears all applicable fees charged by the phone company or Internet service provider when using services that require an Internet connection.

After confirming that the indicator lamp is out, turn the camera off and disconnect the USB cable.

#### Uninstalling the Supplied Software

Only uninstall the supplied software when it is no longer required or before beginning reinstallation. After quitting the software and disconnecting the camera, drag "RAW FILE CONVERTER EX powered by SILKYPIX" from "Applications" into the Trash and select **Empty Trash** in the **Finder** menu (Macintosh), or open the control panel and use "Programs and Features" (Windows 8/Windows 7/Windows Vista) or "Add or Remove Programs" (Windows XP) to uninstall MyFinePix Studio. Under Windows, one or more confirmation dialogs may be displayed; read the contents carefully before clicking **OK**.

# Printing Pictures via USB

If the printer supports PictBridge, the camera can be connected directly to the printer and pictures can be printed without first being copied to a computer. Note that depending on the printer, not all the functions described below may be supported.

## **Connecting the Camera**

1 Connect the supplied USB cable as shown and turn the printer on.





- Pictures can be printed from internal memory or a memory card that has been formatted in the camera.
- Page size, print quality, and border selections are made using the printer.

## **Printing Selected Pictures**

- 1 Press the command dial left or right to display a picture you wish to print.
  - To print one copy of the current picture, proceed directly to Step 3.
- 2 Press the command dial up or down to choose the number of copies (up to 99). Repeat steps 1-2 to select additional pictures.
- 3 Press MENU/OK to display a confirmation dialog.



4 Press MENU/OK to start printing.









#### Printing the Date of Recording

To print the date of recording on pictures, press **DISP/BACK** in the PictBridge display and select **PRINT WITH DATE** (to print pictures without the date of recording, select **PRINT WITHOUT DATE**). To ensure that the date is correct, set the camera clock before taking pictures. Some printers do not support date printing. See the printer manual for details.

# Creating a DPOF Print Order

The **PRINT ORDER (DPOF)** option in the playback menu can be used to create a digital "print order" for PictBridge-compatible printers or devices that support DPOF.

#### DPOF

DPOF (**D**igital **P**rint **O**rder **F**ormat) is standard that allows pictures to be printed from "print orders" stored on the memory card. The information in the order includes the pictures to be printed and the number of copies of each picture.

# WITH DATE C/WITHOUT DATE

To modify the DPOF print order, select PRINT ORDER (DPOF) in the playback menu and press the command dial up or down to highlight WITH DATE C or WITHOUT DATE.



WITH DATE C: Print date of recording on pictures.







# Viewing Pictures on TV

To show pictures to a group, connect the camera to a TV using an HDMI cable (available separately from third-party suppliers; note that the TV can only be used for playback, not shooting).

- **1** Turn the camera off.
- 2 Connect the cable as shown below.



- Be sure the connectors are fully inserted.
- **3** Tune the television to the HDMI input channel. See the documentation supplied with the television for details.
- **4** Turn the camera on and press **▶** button. The camera monitor turns off and pictures and movies are played back on the TV. Note that the camera volume controls have no effect on sounds played on the TV; use the television volume controls to adjust the volume.
  - The USB cable can not be used while an HDMI cable is connected.
  - Some televisions may briefly display a black screen when movie playback begins.

# **Optional Accessories**

The camera supports a wide range of accessories from FUJIFILM and other manufacturers.

#### **Rechargeable Li-ion batteries**

**NP-95**: Additional large-capacity NP-95 rechargeable batteries can be purchased as required.

#### **Battery chargers**

**BC-65N**: Replacement battery chargers can be purchased as required. At +20 °C/+68 °F, the BC-65N charges an NP-95 in about 210 minutes.

#### Shoe-mounted flash units

**EF-20**: This clip-on flash unit (powered by two AA batteries) has a Guide Number of 20/65 (ISO 100, m/ft.) and supports TTL flash control. The flash head can be rotated upwards 90° for bounce lighting.

**EF-42**: This clip-on flash unit (powered by four AA batteries) has a Guide Number of 42/137 (ISO 100, m/ft.) and supports TTL flash control and auto power zoom in the range 24–105 mm (35 mm format equivalent). The flash head can be rotated 90° up, 180° left, or 120° right for bounce lighting.

EF-X20: This clip-on flash unit has a Guide Number of 20/65 (ISO 100, m/ft.).







#### Leather cases

LC-X1005: This leather case, exclusively for use with the X1005/X100, combines practicality with the luxury of leather and comes with a shoulder strap made of the same material. Pictures can be taken and batteries and memory cards inserted or removed with the camera still in its case.

#### Adapter rings

**AR-X100**: An aluminum adapter ring exclusively for use with the X100S/X100. It is used when attaching the LH-X100 lens hood or φ49 mm filters available from third-party suppliers.







# Caring for the Camera

To ensure continued enjoyment of the product, observe the following precautions.

#### Storage and Use

If the camera will not be used for an extended period, remove the battery and memory card. Do not store or use the camera in locations that are:

- exposed to rain, steam, or smoke
- very humid or extremely dusty
- exposed to direct sunlight or very high temperatures, such as in a closed vehicle on a sunny day
- extremely cold
- subject to strong vibration
- exposed to strong magnetic fields, such as near a broadcasting antenna, power line, radar emitter, motor, transformer, or magnet
- in contact with volatile chemicals such as pesticides
- next to rubber or vinyl products

#### Water and Sand

Exposure to water and sand can also damage the camera and its internal circuitry and mechanisms. When using the camera at the beach or seaside, avoid exposing the camera to water or sand. Do not place the camera on a wet surface.

#### Condensation

Sudden increases in temperature, such as occur when entering a heated building on a cold day, can cause condensation inside the camera. If this occurs, turn the camera off and wait an hour before turning it on again. If condensation forms on the memory card, remove the card and wait for the condensation to dissipate.

#### <u>Traveling</u>

Keep the camera in your carry-on baggage. Checked baggage may suffer violent shocks that could damage the camera.

# Appendix

# Glossary

Exif Print: A standard for storing information with pictures for optimal color reproduction during printing.

**HDMI** (High-Definition Multimedia Interface): An interface standard for the transmission of images and sound that adds audio input to the DVI interface used to connect computers to displays.

JPEG (Joint Photographic Experts Group): A compressed file format for color images. The higher the compression rate, the greater the loss of information and more noticeable drop in quality when the picture is displayed.

**MOV**: A movie file format (extension ".mov") developed by Apple, Inc., and viewed using QuickTime Player. This format is popular on the Internet.

White balance: The human brain automatically adapts to changes in the color of light, with the result that objects that appear white under one light source still appear white when the color of the light source changes. Digital cameras can mimic this adjustment by processing images according to the color of the light source. This process is known as "white balance."

# Memory Card Capacity

The following table shows the recording time or number of pictures available at different image sizes. All figures are approximate; file size varies with the scene recorded, producing wide variations in the number of files that can be stored. The number of exposures or length remaining may not diminish at an even rate. A limited number of test pictures can be taken when no memory card is inserted.
